AROUND THE STATE.

The general assembly of the United Presbyterian church, which closed its sessions at Greenville, Pa., last Wednesday, selected Washington, Iowa, as the place for holding its next meeting. The meeting of the general assembly will be preceded by that of the general committee of missions at Crawfordville, this state.

In the Red Oak Express, among the names of this year's high school graduates, we note that of Merrill J. Holmes. Merrill is well remembered as a former member of the Denison high school. He is a bright, promising young man and if he had remained here would have graduated with the class of 1904.

We note among our exchanges that a number of the schools throughout the state have taken up the plan of exhibiting their work to the patrons, among them being the Jefferson schools who held a successful exhibit a few days ago at which there was a large attendance.

The P. E. O's at Mt. Airy have turned themselves into sort of a Village Improvement club and are now trying to secure the installment of a town clock in the court house tower at that place.

The graduating class of thirteen at Jefferson presented "The Merchant of Venice" on commencement night to a large audience. Judge Horace E. Deemer of Red Oak, a member of the supreme court of Iowa, delivered an address to the class at the same time upon the theme "Success."

M. H. Rosenboon was struck and killed by lightning on Tuesday of last week while standing in the door of his barn three miles southeast of Sheldon, Ia. James McCarty, a neighbor, who was standing at his side, was badly stunned by the bolt.

A Milwaukee passenger train near Perry was wrecked last Wednesday night, piling up ten passenger coaches and killing one of the passengers and seriously injuring the baggageman and brakeman. The train was traveling at the rate of sixty miles an hour, the wreck being caused by the washing out of a culvert.

The German Lutherans of the southern district of Iowa held a three days conference at Boone last week. Nearly fifty preachers were present out of a total of sixty in the district.

A field meet between the high school and Y. M. C. A. teams of Boone was held in that city last week.

Harlan was visited by a severe storm of rain last week, badly washing some of the cornfields in that vicinity. During the storm lightning struck the barn of Chas. Miller in North Harlan and killed two horses.

A row was precipitated at Atlantic last week when the mayor appointed three ladies as members of the city library board to succeed the three gentlemen who had been serving in that capacity. The council seriously objected to the appointments and wished to retain the old members, who are leading business and professional men of the town.

The use of trading stamps has been discontinued by the merchants of Sioux City since the first of this month. The stamp companies declare that there has been more excitement in Sioux City over the trading stamp than in any other city where they have been introduced. Since the first of last January nearly 14,000 books were redeemed in merchandise by the two trading stamp concerns, representing purchases aggregating \$1,400,000.

A new company known as the Iowa Brick & Fuel Co. has been incorporated at a capitalization of \$50,000 for the purpose of developing the vast field of peat beds which have recently been discovered in the vicinity of Dows. The quality of the peat has been pronounced by experts to be the best known. The stock in the new company is largely owned by farmers.

A deposit of natural gas has been discovered in Carroll county, and a well has been sunk which promises to yield large profits.

The town of Woodbine was struck by a small tornado Wednesday evening, unroofing a few buildings and twisting some of the trees considerably. No one is reported as injured by the storm.

Boone County Republican: "One grave objection to the local primary system," declares the Knoxville Journal, "is the concentration of power in the towns. The rural districts are placed at a great disadvantage in being farther away from the polling places. In the event of bad weather or of the primary being held at an extremely busy season, the farmer vote at primaries will be light, whereas the city vote can all be cast without inconvenience to the voter."

On the other hand it must be borne in mind that it is seldom more than two or three miles that a farmer must go to vote at a primary and the precinct is usually fairly well represented. On the other hand a storm often keeps delegations at home when they would have to go fifteen miles to the county seat. A least a thorough trial in Boone county has convinced the voters that the primary system gives a better expression of the will of the people."

New Homes in The West

A Brief Description of the Rosebud Reservation Lands to be Thrown Open to Settlement.

The unallotted lands of the Rosebud Indian Agency, situated in Gregory County, S. D. have been turned over to the Government for public allotment. Congress has enacted the necessary laws, and one more of the few choice tracts of public lands now remaining is to be thus opened. The Rosebud Indian Reservation is probably, acre for acre the richest piece of public land that the Government now controls. In fact it is doubtful if any reservation ever thrown open by the Government represented so high an actual average value for its lands on the day of opening.

The lands in question comprise 382,000 acres situated between the Missouri and Niobrara rivers in the southeastern part of South Dakota, in the great corn belt, where adjacent lands are selling out from \$25.00 to \$40.00 per acre. The Government dispose of the public lands of the reservation at a nominal sum in easy payments—\$1.00 per acre in cash, 75c per acre at the end of two years, 75c more at the end of the third and fourth, and within six months after the expiration of the fifth year, a total of \$4.00 an acre.

Nor are these lands lacking in means of transportation. The direct line of the Chicago & North-Western Railway extends from Chicago, Peoria, Milwaukee, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Sioux City, Des Moines, Council Bluffs and Omaha, to the reservation border at Bonesteel. With through train service and special low rates for homeseekers, this El Dorado is reached by an inexpensive and pleasant trip through some of the most beautiful agricultural country in the world.

WHO IS ENTITLED TO THE LAND
Any citizen of the United States, 21 year of age or over, male or female, and heads of families under 21 years of age, are entitled to enter a homestead of 160 acres or less while every soldier of the war of the Rebellion or the war with Spain, who was honorably discharged, secures the special advantage of having his time of service deducted from the time of residence required on hand. Five years' residence is required, except as mentioned above.

LOCATION OF LAND OFFICES
The United States Land Registry Offices are located at Bonesteel, Fairfax and Yankton, S. D. In visiting the Rosebud country, you should purchase ticket en route via The North-Western Line, the only railway reaching the Rosebud reservation. The town of Bonesteel is only three miles from the reservation border, the North-Western Line extending directly through to the border line. Fairfax the county seat of Gregory County, is on the North-Western Line, four miles southeast of Bonesteel and Yankton, on the Missouri River, east of the reservation, is via the North-Western Line.

In order to register for these lands it is necessary to appear at the registration office in person (except in the case of ex-soldiers and ex-sailors). The registration will begin Tuesday, July 5 and end Saturday July 23. Registration cannot be effected through the mails or the employment of agents.

No person will be permitted to register more than once, or in any other than his true name.

Each applicant will, when registered be given a certificate entitling him to go upon and examine the lands to be opened to settlement, to enable him to select understandingly. Drawings will be made from the names of registered applicants, beginning Thursday, July 25, to determine the order in which those registered will be permitted to select land on which to make homestead entry and settlement. Notice will be sent to those drawing numbers 1 to 100 to appear at Bonesteel August 9 and so on at the rate of 100 per day, until all lands are allotted.

Each applicant will be notified of his number and the date upon which he may make entry, by postal card mailed to address furnished by him.

The result of each days drawing will also be given to the press to be published as a matter of news.

On the date of entry each applicant must personally present certificate of registration theretofore issued, and make the first payment of \$1.00 per acre, this to be done at the land office at Bonesteel, S. D.
