On Sunday evening the baccalaureate sermon was preached at the Methodist church by Rev. J. H. Sharpe. The service was union in character and a large audience was present to hear the discourse, the side rooms being thrown open to accommodate the large number that attended.

The text for the sermon was the first verse of the twelfth chapter of Romans, "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." The address was given purely from the standpoint of a teacher of religion and was full of practical, helpful admonition.

### SOCIETIES CONTEST FOR CUP.

The annual contest between the two societies for the possession of the Master's cup was held Monday evening at the college chapel. The two societies are the Athenaeum and the Zonian and for the past year the cup has been in the possession of the Athenaeum society. The contest this year was a close one but the defenders of the cup were declared the winners. O. M. Criswell, R. Shaw Van and Rev. J. H. Sharp were the judges of the contest.

The cup is awarded according to the following rules: The society winning the recitation is awarded 15 points; the oration, 23 points; the essay 24 points; and the debate, 28 points.

The recitation was easily won by Fred Soehl for the Zonian society, being the piece with which he won second at the state high school contest a year ago; but Miss Johnson rendered her selection well and it was thoroughly enjoyed by the audience.

The oration contest was won for the Athenaeum society by F. M. Essex, his subject being "The Louisiana Purchase" with which he represented the college at the Northwestern Iowa Oratorical contest.

Although Roy Towne's production was not so long as that of his opponent it was fully as good. His delivery was good but he lacked the experience which his opponent has and was not successful in winning the contest for his society.

The essays by Florence Wearmouth and Katie Hassett both seemed equally good but was won by the representative of the Zonians. Both productions are excellent pieces of English and contain beautiful lessons of life.

The debate was won by the affirmative. The question, "Resolved, That Nature to make an Orator," was ably

discussed from both points of view, but according to the decision of the judges the speaker with a wide knowledge of affairs and a special insight into the subject in hand has more influence over men, as far as influencing their actions is concerned, than the ignorant spell binder, be he ever so endowed with natural oratorical ability.

Quite a large audience attended the contest, thus manifesting the interest which the people of the town take in the work of the students.

### MUSIC AND ORATORY RECITAL

Last night at the Germania hall was held the closing recital of the departments of music and oratory. Miss Bertha Newcom is the graduate in music and Miss Hilda Brodersen in oratory.
