


FOUR POINTS TO REMEMBER.

Every farmer and everybody else ought to remember four points that have been established by the Iowa courts. First—If your dog runs out on the public highway and frightens a team, you are responsible for the damage done. Second—If you own bees and they fasten themselves upon a team passing along the highway and the animals run away in consequence, as owner of the bees you are liable for damage. Third—If you leave your team unhitched or in the hands of an incompetent person and it runs away you are liable for damage resulting. Fourth—If you are racing on horseback and are racing with some other fellow and come up suddenly behind a vehicle, dash past the team and thereby cause a runaway, you are liable for damages. It is well to remember these things as we pass along.
