

# TELLS OF THE TEMPLE

Former Denison Boy Now in Salt Lake City.

## WRITES INTERESTING LETTER

C. K. Schafer, Who is in the Civil Service Describes Interesting Points on the Mormon City.

SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH, June 25, 1904.

### THE DENISON REVIEW:

I will try to write a short sketch of my experiences in this and other places in Utah which I hope may contain something of interest to your many readers.

It was a surprise to me to be called to this city, though of course in this work we are liable to be sent to any part of the northwest. Since I am here I am pretty well satisfied that I came. The city for the most part is situated on gently sloping ground, beautified by an abundance of trees and wide streets, cleansed by numerous little streams of water which hurry along most of the streets and serve not only as irrigation channels but also to absorb much of the dust that would otherwise be floating through the air. There are some pretty residences here too, but Denison is good enough for me. Much of the city wires are on poles in the center of the street and the street car service is fairly good. When it comes to living expenses it is conceded that they are one-third higher than in the Missouri Valley region. Cherries and strawberries are at their best now and are really fine.

Of course the things that attract most tourists here are the ones connected with the Utah Mormon church. The first in interest is the celebrated temple and tabernacle. Of the interior beauties of the temple we Gentiles can not discuss from a personal knowledge for only members of the church in good and regular standing and possessed of a certificate from the bishop or priest of their ward in which they reside certifying to this fact, can enter the sacred edifice which is used for sealing wives for time and eternity, and also for the administering of the ordinances of baptism to the living and for the dead. The man with whom I am rooming is a recorder in the temple and it is from him I got most of my information. He says that one of the best things his church likes to do is to look up and trace their ancestors so that they may be baptized for them. He also explained to me the meaning of the symbols carved on the pillars of the structure and showed an inclination to give me any information that I might wish about the church doctrine etc. This is the largest temple that they have though there are three more in this state, at Mant, Logan and St. George. In a public discourse the other Sunday the minister stated that the site for the temple was at Independence, Mo. and that even now they were quietly securing lots there for that purpose.

The tabernacle is of almost equal interest though there is not the air of mystery about that for there everybody is made welcome and a guide will show you through it any day in the week. It is a large oval structure without a single supporting pillar for its arching roof and capable of seating comfortably 8000 people. We are told that not a single nail entered into its structure for nails were not as common then as now, and this no doubt gives it a part at least, of its fine acoustic qualities. The furnishings are very plain, no cushions on the pews nor is there any carpet except in the aisles. However all this is lost sight of when once the grand pipe organ begins to fill the place with a great volume of sound and melody. It is said to be one of the best but no more the largest, in the world and was made of Utah products and by Utah labor. It has recently been remodeled or repaired and is said to be better than ever. The organist is a man of no mean ability and gives a recital twice a week at which the public is permitted to attend free. One quality of this wonderful organ is to imitate the human voice, in fact I do not know for sure even yet if I was deceived or not. When one goes from this tabernacle to one of the other churches in town it seems like going in a child's house for size.

Some weeks ago I took a trip down to the western part of the state to look after some sheep there. I say "down" for it seems as if south ought to be down, though in fact in this instance the place was over 2000 feet higher than Salt Lake. In this state they do not try to raise a crop without the aid of irrigation so I got to see some of the results all along the way. Corn is a rarity, the principal crop is alfalfa or as it is called here, lucerne. Dandelions I never saw growing in such profusion, but they say that it does not interfere much except on land that is pastured after the hay is cut. There is plenty of old hay in the country yet. When we got to the end of the railroad we still had a sixty-five mile ride to make. I knew there was a stage from there but did not look for such an outfit as went out from that town. I

thought it would be an old fashioned six horse concern such as you read about so you may know how it affected me when I saw a common stout spring wagon with a cover all of which looked the much the worse for wear and drawn by a team that looked tired before they got started. So we concluded that we would hire a team of our own and we did. It so happened that a very strong wind was blowing and we had to face it every step of the way. We had lots of sand that night. A part of the road that we went over was through a canyon whose walls in places rose up several hundred feet and so straight that if some of the rocks were loosened the least bit they would come crashing down and woe to anyone passing at that time. It made a fellow feel creepy. When we got to our destination and ready to dip sheep it snowed. Following I had my first experience sleeping in a -heap camp and eating camp fare. They say a person can stand most anything when they get used to it.

### MASSAGING THE SCALP.

The massage of the scalp is at the root of all treatment of the hair. By stimulating the flow of blood to the scalp new vigor is given to the hair. Without this massage hair restoratives are of little avail.

The same glow that the expensive fingers of the masseur produce follows, showing that the circulation in the scalp has been stimulated. The fingers should be pressed on the scalp with sufficient force to cause the blood to tingle.

### TIDAL WAVES.

The Forces Which Start These Dangerous Volumes of Water.

The ocean tidal wave—sometimes called the primitive—is formed by the union of two waves, produced by the combined attractions of the sun and the moon. This wave in its most dangerous form sometimes sweeps over ships in the open sea and in its ordinary course produces the tides proper.

Where the outline of the land, as in the bay of Fundy and the Bristol channel, compresses the force of its flood with narrow estuaries it also gives rise to tidal waves, which are termed derivative and are also known colloquially as "bores," or eagres.

Earthquakes are also a cause of tidal waves of two sorts. One is due to shocks which occur on land and cause a retreat and reflux of the sea within the usual tidal limits, but where an earthquake shakes the sea bed a dome shaped mound of water rises over the center of the disturbance and draws the surrounding water into the vortex beneath it. As this dome subsides it sends an immense rolling mass swinging across the ocean, which creates a most formidable tidal wave.


