## DEMOCRATS MEET.

Invention Last Saturday Fair-ly Well Attended.

### O'CONNOR FOR ATTORNEY.

Receives the Nomination on the Fourth Ballot. Shaw Van a Close Second, With Richardson Third.

The Democratic County Convention to nominate county officers was called to order at the Germania opera house Saturday, Aug. 20, by County Chairman O. W. Wheeler.

S. V. O'Hare was called upon to act as temporary chairman, and G. L. Caswell was called as temporary secretary. On motion committees of five each were appointed on Credentials, Permanent Organization and Resolutions, as follows:


Committee on permanent organization reported in favor of making the temporary organization permanent.

Following the reading and the adoption of resolutions came the nomination of officers. The first in order was that of county auditor. Motion made that inasmuch as there was but one candidate for the office, M. J. Collins be nominated by acclamation. Motion unanimously carried, and M. J. Collins was nominated, and accepted in a speech made in German.

Motion made that there was only one candidate for the office of county clerk, that he be nominated by acclamation. Frank Paul was nominated and he likewise thanked the convention for the nomination.

Motion made that as Mr. McKim was the only candidate for the office of county recorder that he be nominated by acclamation. Motion carried.

The next office to be filled was that of county attorney, and a motion was made that the convention proceed to an informal ballot. Carried.

Motion by Volerson of Soldier, that no township pass its vote, but vote when called upon, carried.

On the informal ballot the vote stood as follows:—Richardson 545, Swasey 48, Shaw Van 34, O'Connor 31, Burch 10.

On the first formal ballot the result was as follows:—Richardson 51, Swasey 32, Shaw Van 52, O'Connor 35, Burch 8.

The second informal ballot was as follows:—Richardson 48, Swasey 31, Shaw Van 63, O'Connor 36.

The third formal ballot was as follows:—Richardson 30, Swasey 22, Shaw Van 59, O'Connor 67.

The fourth ballot resulted as follows:—Richardson 3, Swasey 5, Shaw Van 75, O'Connor 95.

O'Connor having received a majority of the ballots cast was declared the nominee. Mr. O'Connor was called for and in making his speech of acceptance thanked the convention for the honor, saying that it had come unsolicited, that he would do his best to be elected, and if elected would do all he could to make his administration successful.

The next and last office to be filled was that of county supervisor to succeed John Holland. There being no other candidate Mr. Holland was nominated by acclamation. Upon being called upon for a speech he thanked the convention.

Moved to adjourn. Carried.

### OBITUARY.

William S. Higley was born near Dow City, Nov. 23, 1882, and died in Nevada, Mo., Aug. 16, 1904. This marks the short span of one promising life. Mr. Higley was well known to the people of this vicinity. His early school days were spent in the rural schools and at Dow City. He entered Denison Normal and Business college in the fall of 1898 and graduated from the college preparatory course in 1901. After spending a year teaching he entered Cornell college in the fall of 1902, and would have graduated from that institution in the coming year.

Mr. Higley was a favorite among his fellow students. He was a member of the A. L. A. literary society and took an active part in literary work which laid the foundation for his success in his college course. At Cornell he had been elected to represent the college in the state contests as a debater, an honor which only the best might hope to obtain.

The funeral of Mr. Higley was held



in Dow City on Friday afternoon, August 19. The father, the only surviving brother, and Miss Samantha Higley accompanied the body from Missouri. The services were held at the M. E. church, of which he was a member. The pastor of the church, Rev. Varley, conducted the services, and instead of delivering a sermon he called for addresses from those who were intimately acquainted with the deceased. Principal Van Ness, of Denison Normal, Prof. H. H. Prier, of Cornell and a classmate from Cornell gave short addresses.

The body was laid to rest in the Dow City cemetery beside two brothers who have been buried there.

The Jonsson young people whose father was killed by the cars here not long ago had a serious time in their efforts to recover back the property of the dead man when was taken possession of by the coroner. It seems to us that the coroner had no business with these effects, and to hand on to them was worse. If he can show any one why he held them, and by what authority, we would like to have him do so. They belonged to the relatives of the man who was killed, and should have been held in trust by the mayor of Acion till the right parties claimed them. —Arion Aanon.

### NOTICE A CHANGE IN DATE.

Republican County Convention to be Held on Friday, Sept. 9th, Instead of Saturday the 10th.

Owing to the fact that the P. H. Levin Repertoire Co. have a contract for the Germania Opera House three nights, ending Sept. 10, and a matinee on the 10th the date for holding the republican county convention has been changed to Friday, Sept. 9th instead of Saturday Sept. 10th. ### NEW COLLEGE COURSE ADDED

Denison Normal and Business College Adds a Correspondence Department.

The Denison Normal and Business college has inaugurated a correspondence course in which instruction will be given by mail in shorthand, book-keeping, commercial law, and all grades of county certificates to those desiring that kind of instruction. This move is in keeping with the progress of other schools and universities in the United States, which have installed correspondence courses, is the proper spirit with which to meet the competition of the various correspondence schools over the country. Those at the head of the college do not advise any one to take this kind of a course, as it in no way equis the benefit to be derived from direct contact with teachers and fellow students, but they are prepared to supply it to those who desire it. To those who wish to take a correspondence course we would advise that you patronize the home institution which you know something about rather than trust your money to so-called schools in the large cities who do business behind post-office box numbers.
