**COURT HOUSE NOTICE.**

Notice is hereby given, that in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Crawford County, Iowa, at a regular session held on the 18th day of June, 1904, the following question will be submitted to the said electors of said county at the general election to be held on Tuesday, November 8th, 1904: Shall the county of Crawford, in the state of Iowa, borrow not to exceed forty thousand dollars at a rate of interest not to exceed four per cent per annum, to be used for the purpose of constructing and adding a dome to the court house now in process of construction in Denison, Iowa; in furnishing a heating plant, ventilation, plumbing, electric wiring, furnishings, wainscoting and filling for, and otherwise perfecting the construction of said court house; and to issue not to exceed forty negotiable bonds therefor of the denomination of one thousand dollars each, payable ten years after the date thereof and drawing interest not to exceed four per cent per annum, payable annually, reserving the option to said county to pay any or all of said bonds at any time after five years from the date thereof, also for levying an annual tax at the September meeting of the said board of supervisors in each year, beginning with the year 1905, on the taxable property of said county, not to exceed 5 mills on the dollar of the county valuation in any one year, and continuing from year to year, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and the bonds themselves when they become due.
