


COLUMBUS BUGGY GIVEN AWAY FREE





Description of Columbus Buggy

Wrought Bailey loops, clipped on. Wheels 4-in., screwed rims. Axles long distance, dust proof. Rubber head springs, 36-in. Leather quarter top, curved joints, with curved extension joints. Leather trimming, with fancy back. Spring cushion and back. Steele cornered body. Painting, gear wood finish, body black, nicely decorated. Full nicked, including double line back rail, single line seat rails, seat handles, and double line dash rail. With leather trimming and shafts.
