VISITS NEBRASKA

Theo. Walker Writes of His Recent Trip.

PLEASED WITH THE COUNTRY

Farmers in Harlan County Are in Prosperous Condition, A Large Variety of Crops Yield Good Returns.

EDITOR DENISON REVIEW:— I have recently returned from a trip through Nebraska to Harlan county. (Orleans being my objective point.) It occurred to me that some of your readers might like to hear of what I saw on the trip. I took particular notice of the country and crops as I passed through the state. Corn generally along the Burlington R. R. is not near as good as that in this country, but the winter wheat is very fine, most of it is up and covers the ground, and as it is all sown with a press drill it is even on the ground, and pleasing to one who is interested in growing crops. I found a very fine farming country in Harlan county, and although I had heard much of the advantages there for farming, I was agreeably surprised.

The Republican river flows through the southern part of the county, and the valley is from 2 1/2 to 5 miles wide, rising to what is called bench land. The river is from 100 to 300 feet wide, and is nearly a clear stream, plenty of fishing and duck hunting in their season. Emptying into the Republican, near Orleans, are several smaller streams, the Prairie Dog, Sappa, and Beaver, the valleys of all these streams are quite wide, and very productive. The principal crops are winter wheat, corn, oats and alfalfa. The corn is not as good this year as usual, still it runs from 25 to 65 bushels per acre, the latter on the bench lands. Wheat, I think, will average about 23 bushels, fine, hard winter wheat; oats from 40 to 65 bushels, of good quality.

That which most attracts the attention of a stranger are the beautiful green fields of alfalfa. Nearly all of the valley lands will grow alfalfa without irrigation. The crop is cut from three to four times during the summer, and the total yield is on an average of about 5 tons to the acre. When the season is favorable one cutting is saved for seed, which yields on an average about six bushels to the acre. The price for alfalfa hay this season is \$5 per ton in the stack, the buyer baling and hauling it to the station at his own expense. The seed is worth about \$5 per bushel this year, but last year it sold as high as \$9 per bushel, and some yields were as high as 13 bushels per acre. That part of the country I found to be a great hog and cattle country. Some parties are now feeding as many as 1000 hogs, and there are a great many cattle being fed. The officers of the Burlington R. R. say that their shipments of stock on the branch from Orleans to St. Francis (120 miles) are larger than on any other line of similar length in the whole system.

It is very easy farming there, because the ground is plowed only once in four years, and sometimes not as often as that. All the corn is listed, and the wheat and oats are sown with press drills. Much of the wheat is drilled in between the corn rows before the corn is picked. The reason for not plowing oftener is, they claim, that the ground holds the moisture better than when it is plowed. It is not an apple country, but all stone fruits do well. I was told of some extra large peaches that measured 9 1/2 inches in circumference. Lands considering what they will produce are not high in price, from \$15 to \$50 per acre, according to location and improvements. Renters pay 1/3 of the crop. All wells go to sheet water from 40 to 80 feet, and the water is universally good and cool. Every farmer, and many people in town, have wind mills. Lumber is cheap, only \$17 per thousand at Orleans, Alma, and neighboring towns, for common lumber. Orleans is quite a pretty town of about 1000 population, and has the largest trade of any town in the county. I spent a very pleasant week with a former Crawford county farmer, Mr. Mat. Schumaker, and family. Mat has a fine farm in the Republican valley of 400 acres, with a fine house and other improvements to correspond, with no mortgages, besides he has a good bunch of cattle and hogs, and 3000 bushels of wheat in his granary. If any Crawford county folks wish to be treated royally, pay a visit to Mat Schumaker and family.

COURT HOUSE NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Crawford County, Iowa, at a regular session held on the 18th day of June, 1904, the following question will be submitted to the said electors of said county at the general election to be held on Tuesday, November 8th, 1904: Shall the county of Crawford, in the state of Iowa, borrow not to exceed forty thousand dollars at a rate of interest not to exceed four per cent per annum, to be used for the purpose of constructing and adding a dome to the court house now in process of construction in Denison, Iowa; in furnish a heating plant, ventilation, plumbing, electric wiring, furnishings, wainscoting and tiling for, and other wise perfecting the construction of said court house; and to issue not to exceed forty negotiable bonds therefor of the denomination of one thousand dollars each, payable ten years after the date thereof and drawing interest not to exceed four per cent per annum, payable annually, reserving the option to said county to pay any or all of said bonds at any time after five years from the date thereof; also for levying an annual tax at the September meeting of the said board of supervisors in each year, beginning with the year 1905, on the taxable property of said county, not to exceed five mills on the dollar of the county valuation in any one year, and continuing from year to year, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and the bonds themselves when they become due.
