

THE RESULT IN CRAWFORD COUNTY

The Entire County Ticket is Elected. Klinker Makes Grand Run

Crawford County gives Theodore Roosevelt more than 500 majority. The entire republican county ticket is elected by majorities ranging from 40 for Theobald to 500 for Klinker, Judge Conner receives a magnificent endorsement of a 500 majority. The court house proposition carries by 200, this is the story of yesterday's battle at the polls and the best of it is that nobody but the defeated candidates and their personal friends regret the results. Five hundred democrats of Crawford voted for Roosevelt and prosperity, there were gains in nearly every township, votes coming from the Irish, the German and the American democrats. Handicapped by a candidate for President in whom they had no confidence, tired of the jugglery with which their party has been managed, wishing to rebuke the handful of bosses, satisfied with Roosevelt and prosperity, the thinking democrats of the county joined hands with the republicans and the sweeping victory is the result, a victory more tremendous than any republican had dared to hope.

Early in the campaign the republicans recognized the advantage they had in the Presidential candidates and resolved upon an aggressive campaign for republican principles. This plan of campaign was pursued and it was not until ten days before the election that any stress was laid upon the county ticket or that there seemed to be more than a vain hope of electing it.

Naturally after eighteen years of almost uninterrupted defeats, the republicans feel jubilant. It is their turn at last and no one will grudge them the joy of vic-

tory. There is no desire to "gloat" unduly. The republicans recognize that the only way to retain the majority in Crawford county is to merit it, and this they intend to do. With power comes responsibility and this must be realized and is realized by the republicans of the county.

While we are pleased at the election of the county ticket, we are more gratified to know of the many who have come out square-toed for the republican party, who are not only voting for it but talking for it, and who may from this day be accounted active republican workers. We have long predicted that this day would come when the sensible thinking people of Crawford would awake to the inconsistencies of democracy and we can without sacrilege say that we bless the Lord that we have been permitted to see it.

We believe that the election of Roosevelt means uninterrupted prosperity for the next four years. We believe that Crawford, as a republican county, can do better than Crawford as a democratic county. We believe that the election of the good, clean ticket chosen yesterday means a good, clean administration of county affairs. We believe and we shall try, by every means in our power, to see, that republican office holders do their duty and conduct the affairs of the county honestly and well. We hope that next year the republicans may secure a majority of the Board of Supervisors for we believe a republican board would mean economy and better government for the people.

The republicans have nothing to regret as to their campaign or

their campaign methods. They conducted a fair and manly fight for republican principles, they expended what little funds they had for legitimate purposes only, there were no republican "beer drinks," there was no touch of bribery or corruption. Seventy republican speeches were made in the county, some in precincts where a republican speech had not been made for years. It was the kind of a campaign which we have always advocated, believing that the best not the worst was the side to be appealed to.

Ed Theobald will make as good an auditor as Crawford county has ever had. He is a young business man and the immense vote he received at Manilla over Mike Collins is proof of the esteem in which he is held at home.

Mike Houlihan is the idol of Charter Oak, a bright capable young business man who will restore the recorder's office its old-time efficiency.

Claus Pahl hardly expected to be elected, he made but little effort, but those who know him best know that he will conduct the office honestly and well.

If ever a man put up a good fight and deserved the votes he got it was John Klinker and the Germans stood by him nobly. A glance through the election table proves this. Mr. Klinker, aided by the experience of his first term and by the wide acquaintance he now possesses is equipped to give the county the best service as county attorney.

It is with peculiar satisfaction that we announce the election of good old Henry Maynard of Jackson township as a member of the board of supervisors. He is capable, level headed, honest and straight forward. His presence on the board will check favoritism and extravagance and will be a distinct benefit to the people; the fact that he received a large vote in every precinct shows that the people have caught the bipartisan idea as to the board and we believe it will be many years before the board is solidly either republican or democratic again.

As to the court house we rejoice that it is carried and that Crawford is to have a court house worthy of its wealth and of its people. We are especially glad that Mr. Maynard is to be a member of the board so that some of the blunders which made the \$40,000 additional necessary may be corrected or at least not repeated.

We have not changed our mind as to the honesty and capacity of some of the democratic leaders. We are glad that the special train liar is laid to rest, that the would-be bosses have learned that they cannot mortgage the offices years in advance and that they have not the votes of the county in their pockets. For the democratic bosses we have nothing but contempt, for Mr. Collins and Mr. Faul we have sympathy for they were the victims of the unpopularity bred by boss methods over which they had no control. For the p-u-p we have nothing but the contempt that he deserves from all honest, decent, self-respecting men.

Again we wish to congratulate the republicans and the broad minded democrats of Crawford upon their victory, for Roosevelt prosperity and good county government. Especially are we glad that the entire ticket was elected so that there may be no "sore spots" among republicans and that all may work in the future as they did this year, shoulder to shoulder for the good of the party.

NEXT NATIONAL CONGRESS

REPUBLICANS WILL HAVE MAJORITY OF FIFTY.

HOLD OWN IN ALL DISTRICTS

Several Changes Brought About in the Several States by the Election. Republican Majority in Senate Will Show Little Change.

Washington, Nov. 9.—President Roosevelt is assured of the co-operation of a Republican congress. The present Republican majority in that body is thirty-four, and there need be no surprise if this figure is almost doubled, and it is reasonably certain to reach a majority of at least fifty. In practically all districts the Republicans have held their own, while in some significant instances the Democrats have lost. Probably the most marked of these cases are the Fourth and Fifth districts of California (San Francisco), now represented by Representatives Livermash and Wynn (Dems.), which reports indicate have been gained by the Republicans. In the Twelfth Ohio district, Taylor (Rep.) is reported to have defeated Badger, the sitting Democratic member, who was a candidate for reelection. The most surprising of all the reports come from the Fourth and Fifteenth Missouri districts, strongly Democratic, and the former represented by Mr. Cowherd, chairman of the Democratic congressional campaign committee. The Republicans claim to have carried both districts. In the light of these reports, a Republican majority of fifty in the house is considered a conservative estimate. Returns from the southern states show that they have returned the usual Democratic majorities on congressmen as on other candidates. Among the early dispatches was one indicating the certain return of Speaker Cannon.

The result justified the wisdom of the Republican policy, which was to give especial attention to the campaign to doubtful and close congressional districts. It is probable the Republican majority in the senate will show little, if any, change from the present voting strength there.

Connecticut. New Haven, Nov. 9.—It is estimated that Roosevelt's plurality will reach almost 33,000, which is several thousand ahead of McKinley's figures in 1900. On the state ticket, from governor down, as well as the congressional, there was a clean sweep.
