State Regent Visited the Local Chapter Last Wednesday.

PRESENTS CHARTER TO THEM

Meeting Held at the Home of Mrs. Mary L. K. Young, Where a Beautiful Gavel Was Presented.

The Denison Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution met on November 12, 1904, at the home of Mrs. Mary L. K. Young, Registrar of the Chapter. The parlors were beautifully decorated with national colors, a fine old portrait of Washington being a distinguishing feature of the decoration. The occasion for this meeting was the presence of the State Regent Mrs. Maria Purdy Peck of Davenport, who came to present the local chapter with its Charter and install the members as a working chapter of the D. A. R. After the members assembled they were formally introduced to the State Regent, after which the meeting was opened by the Chapter Regent Mrs. Alexandra Robinson by singing the national hymn "America" and an invocation by the Chaplain Mrs. Helen M. Cassidy. Mrs. Young then presented the Chapter with a gavel in the following well chosen words:

"Madam Regent, in behalf of my sister and myself, I present to you this gavel. It is made of wood taken from the home of our ancestors, the house was built in 1745 and still stands on the old site in the city of Lancaster, Pa. In this house Washington was an honored guest, from it six sons went out to fight for God, home and native land."

The Regent with appropriate remarks accepted the gavel in behalf of the chapter as follows:

"The gavel presented to us brings with it the memories of the founders of the republic and of the heroic men and women that our society was founded to commemorate. It is an eminently fitting therefore, that we, the Daughters of the American Revolution should have our deliberations directed by this gavel, made from wood taken from a house in which Washington had been entertained, and from which men went forth to battle in the war of the Revolution."

A rising vote of thanks was given to the donors by the Chapter, for the beautiful and useful gift.

The State Regent was then introduced in her official capacity and outlined the work of the order and gave her report of the past year's work in Iowa, she stated in her report, that the Denison Chapter was the banner chapter of the state for rapid organization, she then presented the chapter with its Charter, which was accepted by the Regent. Mrs. W. A. McHenry past National President of the W. R. C. was an honored guest and in response to a call for an address, spoke very charmingly, dwelling upon the fact that the objects of the two societies were similar and wished great success to this new patriotic society, the formal part of the meeting was then closed by a tap of the silver gavel, in which is inlaid the silver initials D. A. R. The social hour then followed, which gave all the members an opportunity to better acquaint themselves with the state officer.

Mrs. Peck is a woman of charming personality and rare executive ability. The ladies felt that her coming has inspired them with new zeal and inspiration to enlarge the chapter and advance the patriotic purpose of the order, and the welfare of its members.

The Denison chapter has now twenty-six members, and several applications for membership pending, delicious refreshments were served, after which they adjourned, all agreeing that the day will be long remembered by the D. A. R.'s of Denison.
