## JAP PRINCE IN DENISON.

Half Brother of Japanese Emperor Passes Through This City Late Saturday Night Enroute East.

Late last Saturday night the half brother of the emperor of Japan passed through Denison over the Northwestern railway. He is Lieutenant General Prince Sadaura Fushima and is an envoy carrying the mikado's thanks to the people of America for their expressed friendliness to Japan, and visits us for the purpose of cultivating more friendly relations between the two countries. He was accompanied by a retinue of servants and several notables of the court of Japan. A United States secret service man was in charge of the party.

Prince Fushima is a Japanese war hero, having been in command of the first division of the Japanese army at the battle of Nanshan, one of the heaviest battles fought before Port Arthur. His eldest son, who is a lieutenant in the Japanese navy, was wounded in an engagement before Port Arthur while serving on Admiral Togo's flagship.

The prince and his party, which includes about a score of servants, sailed from Yokohama September 23, and will return on the steamer Mongolia from San Francisco on December 28. He will spend the time visiting the cities of the east, including St. Louis.

The November term of the district court convened yesterday afternoon at the city hall with Hon. Z. A. Church of Jefferson on the bench. The usual number of unimportant cases are up for trial and the session promises to be short and uninteresting.
