Thirty years ago Christian women of this nation, appalled by the evils and dangers of intemperance, invited all women to unite with them under the name of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in the following pledge:

"I hereby solemnly promise, God helping me, to abstain from all distilled, fermented and malt liquors, including wine, beer and cider, and to employ all proper means to discourage the use of and traffic in the same."

Nearly two hundred thousand women from every state and territory of this nation are now banded together under this pledge, which is an authoritative and condensed statement of their doctrine as to alcoholic drinks.

First, that alcohol is a substance whose nature it is, absorbed into the blood, to injure health and destroy life.

Second, that alcoholic drinks share with other narcotic poisons the power, when taken in small quantities, to destroy self-control and to create the uncontrollable and destructive craving or more that ends in drunkenness. Ability to resist this power varies with individuals, age, and other conditions; but not even adult drinkers who think themselves non-susceptible can be sure how long they can remain non-susceptible. Ordinarily, the fatal line between possible self-control and slavery to alcohol is passed unconsciously by the drinker. Alcohol, through its action on the brain and nerves, deadens ability for close observation and accurate reasoning, and

thus disqualifies the drinker for making a careful diagnosis of his own case. The foregoing being some of the evil characteristics and effects of alcohol, we do not hesitate to say that temperance means total abstinence from all alcoholic drinks for children, youths, and adults; and hence the true meaning of the word calls for no change in our name. Usage or custom decides the meaning of words.

German Scientist Attacks Beer.

George Kefenstein attacks the fallacy that beer is a safer drink than whiskey, and says:

"So far as pathological lesions are concerned, no appreciable differences exist between beer drinkers and those who are addicted to the stronger alcoholic liquors. Furthermore, the early idea that beer drinking would largely do away with the use of brandy, whiskey, etc., has proved fallacious so far as Germany is concerned."

"The nutritious qualities of beer, which have been loudly exploited by many, are not to be considered when compared with the damage wrought by the alcohol which it contains. Taken all in all, the substitution of beer for the stronger alcoholic liquors as a beverage has been a failure, since its devotees neither live longer nor show better mentality than the consumers of brandy, whisky, and the rest."

The W. C. T. U. Temple in Chicago.

The Woman's Temperance Building Association was incorporated under the laws of the state of Illinois, July 13, 1887 for the purpose of constructing a building suitable for a hall, auditorium, and offices of the National W. C. T. U. and such other offices as are necessary for the Temperance work.

Nov. 1, 1890 the corner stone was laid in the sight of rejoicing thousands and the building was completed in 1892. It is the proof; the material used being granite. Willard Hall, seating 600 is on the ground floor and is lined with marble divided into panels, in which is inscribed the names of unions and individual donors who have contributed \$100 or more. It is probably the most beautiful office building in the world; 'a poem in stone' and in its intended use it is the embodiment and symbol of every beautiful and useful work.

The daily rescue meeting makes it a house of prayer for all nations. The inscription cut into the stone over the front entrance is a standing proclamation of the aims of the W. C. T. U. throughout the world. The progress of the building has been marked at every stage by prayer.
