### COUNTY CLUBS AT IOWA CITY

University Students Perfect County Organizations. Crawford County Leads the List.

We are in receipt of an interesting letter from Fred Soehl, a Denison boy, now a student of the state university, in which he tells of a movement which has been set on foot by the students of the university to organize all the students into a county club. Following is the letter:

IOWA CITY, IOWA, Dec. 20, 1904.

EDITOR, THE REVIEW,

Dear Sir:—  
In accordance with a general university movement, the students of Crawford county met on Dec 19, and organized a county club. The purpose of the organization is to facilitate a closer bond of fellowship between the students of the county and to promote the interests of the University. Any person who is, or who has been at any time, a student of the University of Iowa, is eligible and shall be considered a member by virtue of such eligibility. This necessarily brings the university in direct touch with the alumni, a problem of great interest of late about the state.

At the meeting Ray Randall acted as temporary chairman and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

President..... Lorenz Lorenzen  
Vice-President..... A. E. Miller  
Secretary & Treasurer..... Fred H. Soehl  
Crawford is the most strongly represented county in the state, considering distance and population. The total number enrolled is 17, 15 of which are contributed by Denison alone.

One of the secretary's duties is to report items of interest to the official county papers, hence this "write-up."
