ANOTHER SEED CORN TRAIN.

There will be run over the Illinois Central Railroad lines in Iowa a "Seed Corn Special" train, in which Prof. P. G. Holden, and assistants, of the Iowa State College at Ames, will give short lectures on the important topic of the proper selection of seed for corn growing. These talks, with the exception of where evening lectures are arranged for, will be given in the cars on the train, so that seats can be had no inconvenience experienced account of any possible inclement weather. They will be straight, practical and easily understood talks, and should be of great interest to Iowa farmers and others. Among others greatly interested in the movement of this and similar educational trains throughout the state, is the Iowa Grain Dealers' Association, of which Mr. G. A. Wells is secretary, at Des Moines: thus showing the mutual interest in the question between the dealer and the grower. The importance of the enormous corn crops of Iowa to the particular financial prosperity of the farmer is so well understood that it can be shown how his crops in that staple can be increased from ten to forty per cent by an intelligent selection of seed, it certainly would seem that such an opportunity should not be neglected. This is pointed out by Prof. Holden in his short half-hour talks, and in such way as to make it easy for the farmer to put it to the test. The train will be scheduled as follows:
