GOES TO KANSAS CITY

Ed. Petersen of the Hub Makes a Lightning Change.

WILL CLOSE DENISON STORE

Has Leased Central Location in Missouri Metropolis and Opens There May 1st.

The most important announcement of the week in Denison business circles is that Mr. E. C. Petersen proposes to close out his stock of clothing and remove to Kansas City. Mr. Petersen believes there is a tide in the affairs of men which should be taken at its flood. He was passing through Kansas City, heard of a fine location that could be leased at a reasonable figure and without further delay he took it. His friends hope that it will lead on to fortune.

Those conversant with Kansas City say that Mr. Petersen's location on Petticoat Lane is one of the best in the city, in the very heart of the retail district. He has a frontage of thirty-five feet and will run an exclusive clothing store. This means that he will sell no gents furnishings, hats and caps, etc., nothing but clothing in the strict sense of the term. He will incorporate several clever and unique ideas in the management of his store and its fittings and we believe he will make a success.

As announced in his advertisement on another page Mr. Petersen has decided not to sell his Denison stock in bulk, but to close it out to the people in a great sale which will run until the entire stock is sold.

Mr. Petersen came to Denison in 1898 as a member of the firm of Judd & Petersen. He opened business in the corner store now occupied by Mr. J. G. Wygant. From the first the firm did a good business and it was not long before Mr. Petersen bought Mr. Judd's interest. Later he moved to his present location in the Goldheim block, where he has enjoyed an ever increasing trade.

Coming here a comparatively poor man, he has made a notable success. He has a fine, large stock of goods here, all of which were bought for cash; he has money in the bank and has been able during the last years of his stay here, especially, to enjoy life without crippling his finances. Mr. Petersen is a jolly, good-natured man, but withal, he has a shrewd eye for business. He has had experience in Milwaukee, Chicago and Sioux City, so that he goes to his new field with the experiences of both a city merchant and a country merchant behind him.

Mrs. Petersen, who is also a first-class "business man," will remain in Denison to superintend the closing out of the Denison stock, and the former clerks, Messrs. Huettman and Smutney, will also remain.

Mr. Fred Soehl, who formerly worked for Mr. Petersen, likes the business so well that he has given up his college course at Iowa City and will go with Mr. Petersen to Kansas City.

THE REVIEW wishes Mr. Petersen and his estimable wife the best possible good fortune in their new home. They have worked hard for success and they will doubtless have to work hard to make an impress in a city so large as Kansas City, but we believe they are fully equal to the task. The location now occupied by the "Hub" is the old established clothing corner of Denison and it will undoubtedly be occupied by some similar firm when Mr. Petersen finally closes his business.
