REVIEW SCHOOL WORK

Parents Inspect Work Done By Puplic School Pupils.

EXHIBIT COVERS WIDE RANGE

Excelent Program Rendered At The Teacher's "At Home" on Friday And Saturday.

The popular institution known as "The Teachers' At Home" proved a magnet that drew scores of parents to the High School building on Friday and Saturday evening. The exhibit covered a wide range from the first efforts of the Kindergarten pupils to the more pentions work of the high school seniors.

The industrial work made a better showing than in preceding years, showing a steady advance in this important branch of school work. It was this feature of the exhibit which appealed with greatest force to the visiting parents and fond mamas inspected with loving eyes the work the little hands have done. The basket work was particularly fine and the water colors used in the making of decorative borders, book covers etc. showed much artistic skill. The humbler work of the home was not neglected and a number of very creditably stitched button-holes were in evidence. The written work of the schools was particularly strong and especially was it good when it is considered that not alone was the best work of the best pupils shown but the every day work of all the pupils. Supt Savage inaugurated the "At Home" several years ago and it has proven extremely popular and has done much to bring parent and teacher into closer relation and to give the parents a better and more sympathetic view of the work the teachers are trying to accomplish for the children under their charge.

The program, which had been arranged for the entertainment of the patrons, was opened by a recitation, "Prisoner of Zenda," by Mary Burch. Miss Burch's interpretation was very fine and she rendered it magnificently.

The next number was a vocal solo "Over the Ocean Blue" by John Moloney. He sings well, and we hope to hear more of him along the musical line, for he has a voice of much promise.

Mr. Treadway, manual training instructor in the Mo. Valley schools was then introduced. Mr. Treadway had brought with him a fine exhibit of the work being done by the High school at that place. After explaining something of the process of establishing the work, Mr. Treadway took up the various steps in the wood working course showing the simple beginnings and the development of more intricate work. He stated that both boys and girls elected the manual training and showed work of equal merit from both. He then took up the ornamental work, especially wood carving and showed some very beautiful and valuable work done by the students.

The work throughout was systematically developed and showed that Mr. Treadway had accomplished unusual results in the first year of the manual work at Mo. Valley. Incidentally he presented many facts of interest concerning the different words that they have studied and collected in the course and revealed many instances of new interest that had been aroused in general school work as a result of getting indifferent students interested in the manual training and into the habit of applying themselves to the work given them.

All who heard Mr. Treadway's excellent address and who saw the work which he presented, were led to appreciate the facts that manual training in a most practical and interesting feature of an educational course, when systematically developed as is being done by Mr. Treadway at Mo. Valley. The practical discussion of this sub-

ject made the program a most valuable one for the patrons who were present. The closing number was the Little Farmer's Drill, given by twelve little boys and girls dressed like farmers on a summer day raking and hoeing in the field. The little folks did themselves credit and the drill proved very amusing.
