On Monday night June 5 occurred the death of Mrs. Mary Nelson at the home of her daughter Mrs. Anna Lindberg at Omaha. Her remains were brought to Kiron for burial. She was born in Misterhult Sweden in the year 1832 and was married in the year 1857 to Peter Nelson and together emigrated to America in the year 1867 locating in Swede Bend. After a short stay they moved to Kiron and were one of the three first families that located in this settlement, to suffer the hardships of pioneer life and to assist in the developing of this locality, from a bare and wild land to the garden spot of Iowa. In the year 1887 death separated her from her husband and a few years later she removed from this locality to

reside with her daughter Mrs. Anna Lindberg in Omaha. During the past eight years she has been an invalid and has required care constantly, suffering from a stroke of paralysis which left her unable to walk. During all this time it is said she bore up under her trials and sufferings with patience and with Christian fortitude. At her death she leaves three brothers two of whom reside in Sweden and Mr. C. F. Clauson of this locality, one sister Mrs. Lottia Erickson of Alcester, S. D. three sons of whom one Rev. S. A. Nelson is a Baptist minister, located at Sparta, Mich., four daughters and fourteen grand children and two great grand children and a large circle of friends and acquaintances to mourn and miss her departure. She was a member of the Baptist church and was a most earnest and devoted Christian. She was one of three members that organized the Baptist sewing circle in Kiron. The funeral services were held at the Baptist church on Sunday afternoon and a large number gathered to pay their last respects and to cast a last look on their former neighbor and friend. The floral tributes were many and beautiful, especially we mention the handsome wreath contributed by the women's sewing circle of Omaha, also the beautiful sheaf of wheat flowers bedecked by her children. Rev. O. Arlander pastor of the Baptist Church of Omaha preached the funeral sermon, whereafter a large number of teams made up the procession that followed the remains to the Kiron cemetery, where she was laid to rest by the side of her husband. The pall bearers were the following pioneers John Erickson, C. E. Engberg, B. N. Benson, John Winquist, Peter Johnston and J. Michaelson. It was impossible for all her children to attend her funeral. Those present were Mr. and Mrs. Lundberg, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Nelson from Omaha and Rev. S. A. Nelson from Sparta, Mich. Peace be unto her though gone on before to the land of eternal bliss, she lingers in the memory of many. The meeting by and bye is yet to be.

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
