### BURN THE MORTGAGE.

The jubilee service at the Presbyterian church last Sunday morning was largely attended, and was one of the happiest days in the history of the church. Special music was rendered by the choir appropriate to the happy occasion. After his usual talk to the children, Mr. Bryce took for his text, Romans, 13:8, "Owe no man anything but to love one another." At the conclusion of the sermon the congregation sang "Blest be the Tie That Binds Our Heart in Christian Love." During the song the church officers came forward, and at its conclusion Mr. Sears McHenry gave a brief financial statement regarding the indebtedness of the church, and announced its complete liquidation. An asbestos lined platter having been placed on the table in front of the pulpit Mr. Bryce crumpled up the cancelled mortgage in his hand, and placing it on the platter handed a lighted candle to Mr. Samuel Smythe, at the same time saying, "Uncle Sam, as you started this good work by giving the first two thousand dollars, it is right that you should finish it up." Mr. Smythe took the candle and set fire to the mortgage, and as it was blazing brightly, and crackling merrily, the congregation arose as a body and joined heartily in singing "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow."

### A VERY EXCITING CHASE.

Federal, County and City Officers Round Up Alleged Disreputables After a Long Chase.

On Saturday evening occurred one of the most exciting chapters in Denison police annals. A wagon containing a man and a woman said to be travelling about the country for immoral purposes, was located inside the city limits near the McHenry farm. A plain-clothes man was detailed to ascertain the nature of the business in which the wandering pair was engaged and when he felt that he had secured sufficient information, Marshal Maloney proceeded to make the arrest. He found himself looking down the barrel of a wicked looking gun. The marshal returned to the city for reinforcements and a posse consisting of the United States Deputy Marshal, the sheriff, deputy-sheriff, marshal, deputy-marshal, and a special officer was soon in pursuit. For the first time was the automobile pressed into the service in Denison as an agent of civilization in the suppression of crime.

George Sprecher was drafted into the service and his auto soon speeded the party to the place where the pair had been. Arrived on the scene, the birds had flown. The posse returned to Denison and then divided. Before long the wagon was located, the posse reunited, and after a chase which extended almost to Kenwood, the arrest was made.

The preliminary hearing was set to be held before Justice Gulick and the announcement of the trial served to fill the Justice's office. By agreement, however, the case was continued until next Monday. There is some criticism of the officers to the effect that it would have been better simply to have warned the couple to move on, and to have saved the county the trouble and expense of the arrest and trial. For our part, we think this is a mistaken idea and very poor public policy. While we are showing undesirables on to the communities west of us, the communities east of us are sending their disreputables to us. The miscreants simply wander from place to place, plying their trade until warned to move on. If they are not good for this community, they are not good for another, and the "move on" policy is both selfish and short-sighted. Of course we do not know as to the guilt of the parties in the present instance, but if there was reason to believe them guilty, we believe the officers did the right and proper thing in causing their arrest.

The case will come up for hearing at Justice Gulick's office on Monday, at 9 a. m.
