### CROP BULLETIN.

Official Report of Iowa Climate and Crop Service. Week Ending July 4.

In the larger part of the state this has been an ideal week for growth of immature crops, with good conditions for harvesting and threshing the ripened cereals. The oats crops is mainly in shock or stack, and threshing returns indicate a yield above the average of recent years. The harvest of spring wheat is nearly finished to the north line of the state, and the general condition of this crop is fairly good in the districts where the average is largest. There has been but few reports of damage by rust. Corn has advanced rapidly in response to high temperatures and generally ample moisture. It is carrying heavily, and the earliest planted fields make good showing of roasting ears. The crop as a whole is very promising. Pastures are holding out notably well. The apple crop has steadily declined, and expert fruitmen report not more than a third of the normal yield for the state.

The August 1st report of crop correspondents has been tabulated, showing following estimates of the conditions of crops on the percentage basis. Corn, 94 per cent; spring wheat, 93; oats, 97; flax, 78; potatoes, 92; pastures, 103; apples, 40; grapes, 91.

Last year at corresponding date the estimates were: Corn, 88; spring wheat, 75; oats 89; flax 94; pastures, 96; potatoes 101; apples 73; grapes, 86.
