THREE DIE IN DENISON

Claus Mundt, Respected German Succumbs to Age.

DEATH OF G. E. HOFFMAN.

Aged Pennsylvania Dies While Visiting His Daughter Mrs. H. A. Boyle. Hattie Burmeister's Life Ended.

Last week we recorded three deaths at Vail, this week it is our sad duty to chronicle the death of three dearly beloved people in this community. One a pioneer of Iowa, one a respected citizen of Pennsylvania and the other a young girl just entering a lovely womanhood.

A Pioneer Citizen.
With all the peace of quiet slumber Mr. Claus Mundt one of the most highly respected of the German pioneers of this county passed away on the morning of Saturday August 19th.

Mr. Mundt was born in Stokendorf Schleswig-Holstein, Jan. 24, 1824. When twenty two years of age he made the then perilous journey to the new world, settling in Davenport, Ia. in 1846. On February 22 1849 he was married to Miss Anna Arp, the faithful, loving wife who survives him, after more than fifty-five years of wedded happiness.

In 1872 Mr. Mundt brought his family to Crawford county purchasing a section of land in Morgan township.

He was one of the highly respected and well beloved members of the old German Settlement, who first taught the lesson that the hills of Crawford made the best farms on earth. His family grew up about him, he had earned a competency and finally he concluded to retire from active labor. He removed to Denison, purchased a home and soon had as comfortable and as well kept a residence as there was in Denison, happy in his home, rejoicing in the success and prosperity of his children and at peace with all the world.

To Mr. and Mrs. Mundt were born six children all of whom survive them and all of whom will be present at the funeral services which take place at the German Methodist church to-morrow at 10 a. m. Rev. A. W. Gauger officiating. The children who are thus called to mourn the death of a kind and loving father are Mr. Henry Mundt of this city. Mrs. Julius Lohfaldt of Chinook, Mont. Edward Mundt of Starbuck, Wash. Mrs. John A. Reper of Denison, Mrs. Irene Beardsley of Schleswig and Mr. Emil Mundt of Chinook, Mont. We extend to the sorrowing loved ones our sympathy and condolence, but know they will have the consolation of the knowledge that their father has but changed the heaven he made for himself in this world for the Heaven of the world to come.

Death of George E. Hoffman.

On Monday evening occurred the death of Mr. Geo. E. Hoffman, father of Mrs. H. A. Boyle of this city. Mr. Hoffman died at the home of Dr. H. A. Boyle from a severe attack of pluro-pneumonia. He had been failing for the past year and it was partly in the hope that the change would do him good that he came from Pennsylvania home. He contracted a cold however which soon took the form of pneumonia and despite all that the closest and most careful medical attention could do, death ensued.

While but little known in Denison Mr. Hoffman was an important factor in the Pennsylvania county in which he spent a long and useful life. He was born in Lewisburg, Pa. Feb. 9, 1835. At the age of fourteen he began to make his own way in the world, beginning as a clerk and later as a bookkeeper for the man whose daughter he afterward married. It was in 1869 that he married Miss Anna R. Morris the loving wife who was his helpmate in every way, as a companion, friend and helper. Mrs. Hoffman was with her husband at the time of his death and the grief of separation after all the years together is heavy indeed.

Soon after his marriage Mr. Hoffman went into the general merchandise business at Cressona, Pa. and he was a prosperous and most highly respected merchant of that city at the time of his death.

Four children survive Mr. Hoffman, Dr. J. L. Hoffman, of Ashland, Pa. Mrs. H. A. Boyle of this city, Harry Hoffman an artist now in Paris, and Mrs. Wm. McCloy who is in Cressona Pa. at present. Brief services were held at the home of Dr. Boyle this afternoon at 5 o'clock, Rev. Dr. E. Miller officiating and this evening the remains will be taken to Pottsville, Pa. for interment. Dr. and Mrs. H. A. Boyle will accompany Mrs. Hoffman and Dr. Hoffman as far as Chicago on the sad journey.

Mr. Hoffman was a typical American. His grand father was one of the brave Germans who came to America and volunteered to serve the cause of liberty with the colonists. He was in the army

under General Washington and was one of those who crossed the Delaware on the perilous Christmas eve and struck the decisive blow at Trenton. Of such ancestry Mr. Hoffman could not well be else than intensely American. At his home his name was synonymous with probity and honesty and good citizenship.

In Denison where for a number of years his daughter Mrs. Boyle has made herself beloved by all, the grief is most sincere and heartfelt for her in her bereavement. It is not given to all children however to have their parents with them for so long a time, and they may well find comfort in the record of affection and manliness and good deeds their father leaves them.

Death of Hattie Burmeister.

Henrietta Isabella Burmeister, daughter of Chris Burmeister and Wilhelmine nee Schmidt, was born the 16th day of Nov. 1834 in Washington township, Crawford county, Ia.

She died the 22nd day of August 1905 at the home of her parents in Washington township after a lingering illness of about four months, death resulting from tuberculosis.

The parents, six sisters, viz Mrs. Wm. Lueck, Mrs. Caroline Watje, the Misses Grace, Tillie, Minnie and Irene. Two brothers Harry and Emil Burmeister mourn the demise of a beloved daughter and sister.

The funeral will take place on Friday next at one o'clock p. m. from the family residence in Washington township, interment following at the Lutheran cemetery near Denison. Rev. Frese will officiate.

PLANS A NEW HOSPITAL.

Architect Barber Has Plans Made For Building to Be Erected by Dr. Johnson.

The new and enlarged hospital for Denison seems to be an assured fact. For years we have been talking about one but as is usually the case it remained for private enterprise to push the matter to a conclusion.

Dr. J. M. Johnson who now with his wife an experienced trained nurse is conducting the city hospital in North Denison is the one who is to give Denison the hospital facilities it long has needed.

He has purchased the McAlpin residence, which is beautifully located on the heights in West Denison and which is being further improved by the street work now being done. To Architect E. R. Barber he has entrusted the making of the plans for the alteration of the old building and for the large addition which is to be built. The McAlpin house is 28x28. The addition will be 36x23, and the entire basement will be fitted for use. The plans seem to be very complete. There will be private rooms, general wards for children, for men and for women.

Sanitation will be carefully watched and the physicians will have every equipment for a fine operating room. The improvement will cost about \$5000, and it will add greatly to the west part of the city, besides giving Denison adequate hospital facilities. As Dr. Johnson is showing his faith in Denison by this investment we believe he is worthy and should have the support of all good citizens in his undertaking. It will certainly be a great relief when people no longer feel under necessity of taking their loved ones to Sioux City or Omaha or some other place in case of sickness.

BETTER MAIL FACILITIES.

The postmaster has been notified that on Sept. 11th mail service will be commenced on the Boyer Valley line between Denison, Deloit and Boyer. This will give much better mail facilities with our neighboring towns as heretofore there has been but one mail a day, via the Illinois Central.

LON RANDALL SELLS.

Surprises all By Sudden Sale of Prosperous Business.

JOHN ROHWER THE BUYER.

Trades Half Section Kansas Land for Broadway Meat Market and Denison Real Estate.

Another business surprise greeted Denison last week when it became known that A. D. Randall had sold the Broadway meat market to Mr. John Rohwer the former West Side Merchant.

The transfer was made on Saturday Mr. Rohwer taking immediate possession. The deal is a trade by which Mr. Randall gets 320 acres of land in eastern Kansas at a price of \$35.00 per acre, or \$11,200, in exchange for his Denison business, his store building on Broadway and the 13 acres on which his slaughter house is located.

"It seems odd to be out of business," said Mr. Randall when seen by THE REVIEW man. "I have been here since 1885, and the people of Denison have been so kind to me that I hate to feel that I am out of it. I do not believe there are any better people on earth than the Denison folks, and I am going to stay right here if I can find a good opening in some other business. I inspected the Kansas land and am satisfied that it is worth all I paid for it. "What am I going to do?" I am going to loaf for a few months just to see what it seems like; after that—well, the sale was so sudden that I have no plans. At any rate, I wish you would tell Denison folks how much I appreciate the kindness they have shown me in all these years. The business has been growing steadily since I bought it of James Williams fifteen years ago and I feel that I would be very ungrateful if I did not tell the people how I appreciate their kindness."

Mr. Rohwer, the purchaser, is an experienced merchant and business man, well known to all the people of the county. He says that he shall try to maintain the excellence of the market as run by Mr. Randall. He will retain the old employes, and employ the same business methods. Mr. Rohwer should make a success of the business, and he doubtless will.

We trust that Mr. Randall will find a business opening in Denison and remain here, as he is a model citizen in every respect.
