

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## ILLINOIS CENTRAL

### G. A. R. Special Service.

The Illinois Central has arranged Special Through Service to Denver for the accommodation of the friends and members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and auxiliary organizations. Through Standard Sleepers, Tourist Sleepers and Free Chair Cars will be run via the Illinois Central to Omaha, thence via the Rock Island direct to Denver.
