## Proposed Resolution of Necessity.

Be it resolved by the city council of the city of Denison, Iowa, that it is deemed advisable and necessary to make improvements by laying a sewer of eight-inch vitrified sewer pipe, to be laid in accordance with specifications furnished by the city engineer and approved by the city council of Denison, Iowa, upon the following named streets and parts of streets, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of Chestnut and Anthony streets and running south to the intersection of Walnut and Anthony streets, thence east to the intersection of Main and Walnut streets.

All expense of making said improvements to be charged to the property abutting thereon and adjacent streets to the distance of 150 feet, in accordance with the law governing the same. And the contractor who shall make said improvements shall keep the same in repair for one year from the date of its acceptance by the city.

Be it further resolved that the city council will meet on the 5th day of October, 1905, at 8 o'clock p. m., at the city hall, for the purpose of considering objections to said proposed resolution, and that notice of said proposed resolution and the passage of this resolution be published as provided by law.
