DIES IN OKLAHOMA

Joseph H. Clough Succumbs to Heart Failure Last Friday.

INTERMENT AT DENISON.

Funeral of this Well Known Pioneer at Kemming Residence at Three O'Clock Tomorrow.

Mr. Joseph H. Clough for many years one of Denison's best known and most highly respected citizens, died last Friday morning at Woodward, Oklahoma. He had been ill but a few days with stomach trouble but on the day prior to his death he was much better and was able to sit up and be about the hotel where he was making his home. He retired about ten o'clock and shortly after mid-night the proprietor, while passing his room noticed through the open door that Mr. Clough was lying in an uncomfortable position. He went in to see if he could be of assistance and found the body already cold in death.

His children were immediately notified and his son Frank who resides at San Marcial, New Mexico, went at once to Woodward. He was delayed twenty-four hours by a burning bridge and it was not until this morning that he was able to reach Denison with the remains of his beloved father.

The funeral services will take place at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. C. Kemming, on to-morrow, Thursday afternoon, at three o'clock, Rev. W. E. Bryce officiating.

Mr. Joseph H. Clough was born in New Hampshire in May, 1831. He came of a long line of Americans, his ancestors having come to this country early in the seventeenth century. He spent his youthful days in New England and it was at Clinton, Massachusetts, that he was married to Sarah Howe, the loving and beloved wife who has preceded him to the grave. In 1867 the Clough family came to Iowa, settling in Maquoketa.

In 1874 he came to Denison and it was here that his family was raised and that he spent the prime of his years. In 1899 he resigned the office of County Coroner to which he had been elected and moved to Oklahoma. He was engaged in the cattle business at Woodward. Last spring he made a trip to Denison to see his old time friends and no one who saw him then appearing so much younger than his years, thought that he would pass from earth before the year had closed.

Mr. Clough leaves three children Mr. Frank Clough of San Marcial, N. M. Mrs. Nettie Smith of Teloga, Oklahoma and Mrs. C. C. Kemming of this city.

Mr. Clough was an honest, honorable and conscientious man. He was a contractor and builder and no man excelled him in workmanship and in an honest effort to do his best. His disposition was of the kindest and he had as many friends as he had acquaintances. He was a good neighbor and an upright citizen and in every way a man beyond reproach.

OBITUARY.

Louise M. Guest was born in St. Mary's, Ontario, April 19, 1860. She was the youngest daughter of John and Alvina Guest. There was a touch of sadness in her life—her father having died a few days previous to her birth, and so she was robbed of his loving care. Later the mother married Mr. Thomas Shillington and with the family removed to Crawford county, Iowa, in 1871. Louise grew to womanhood in Dow City and Dunlap and in 1881 came with the family to Denison, where she became acquainted with Mr. William H. Howard whom she married April 5, 1882. The first years of her married life were spent in Gladbrook, Iowa, to which place her heart has ever clung, for there she buried her only child, an infant son. For the past 18 years she has lived in Kansas City, Mo., or its suburb, RoseJale, Kansas.

Mr. Howard is an expert lumberman and for the past six months has had charge of a mill near Wagoner, Indian Territory, going there temporarily to establish the business for Kansas City capitalists.

After a visit with relatives in Iowa his wife went to Wagoner and spent two months at the camp, returning September 1st to the little home she so much loved at RoseJale, hoping to be joined by her husband in a few weeks. Those who knew her best realized that her health was failing rapidly but yet were not prepared for what was coming. On Sunday, September 17, she was taken sick but not seriously, it was thought, until Wednesday, Thursday she was taken to a hospital and her husband and sisters sent for, but death came early Friday before any of the loved ones reached her. Her niece, Mrs. Jennie Morris Crockett was the only relative with her, her home being in Kansas City. Mrs. Howard was a faithful member of different lodges and the members of these were untiring in their efforts to do for her, as were also the hosts of neighbors and friends. The beautiful floral tributes from

all parts of the city showed how dearly she was loved.

The funeral was held from the Rose Dale Baptist church on Sunday afternoon, September 24, and interment made in the cemetery a few miles distant, this being at her own request.

Besides the husband the relatives who were present were Mrs. Chas. E. Morris of Diller, Neb., Mrs. Chas. K. Meyers of Mason City, Iowa, Mr. P. R. Howard of Gladbrook, Iowa, and Mr. and Mrs. Crockett. The two brothers, George E. of Wakefield, Neb., and Jas. W. Guest of Canada and Mrs. J. M. Foss of Salida, Colo., were not able to be present.
