## FOUND DEAD BY ROADSIDE

August Herring Driving Blind Horse Last  
Night Drives Into Ditch.

## NECK WAS BROKEN BY THE FALL

Body Discovered By Leslie Gulick This Morning. Parents  
Living At Lone Tree Notified. False Report That Car-  
rier Woodruff Was Killed Caused Much Excitement.

The body of August Herring, a laborer was found this morning lying by the roadside just east of the Illinois Central Stock yards. With the body was the overturned cart and the horse lying upon the ground, practically uninjured but unable to get up.

Leslie Gulick, coming into town from his chicken ranch was the first to make the gruesome discovery and he waited not to identify the body but rushed to give the alarm.

Mail Carrier Woodruff takes this route in the morning and as he drives a cart, in some way the report started that it was he who had been killed. The body was quickly identified however as that of August Herring a laboring man who has made Denison his home for a number of years. Last week Mr. Herring worked picking corn for Mr. LaFrantz but on account of the wet weather he decided to go out to Franz Heppner's place to chop wood.

Soon after nine o'clock Mr. Herring and Mr. Heppner left Denison together. They went as far as the West Denison Mills where Mr. Heppner got out as the cart was too small for two. Mr. Heppner walked out to his home along the Illinois Central track and Mr. Herring drove north along the wagon road. Just east of the stock yards the road way is narrow and there is a fairly steep ditch not to exceed five or six feet in depth. In some way the sightless horse got off the road, and fell down the embankment. The cart was overturned and Herring was thrown forward, falling on his head and breaking his neck. Death must have been instantaneous as the body was found all huddled up as if there had been no death agony.

The coroner was notified but upon viewing the remains he decided that no inquest was necessary. No arrangements for the funeral will be made until his people are heard from, from Lone Tree, Ia., where his father is a well to do farmer.

Mr. Herring was between forty and fifty years of age. He came to Denison a number of years ago and worked for several years for Aebischer Bros as butcher and driver. Later he worked as a laborer at whatever offered. He was married but divorced several years ago, his former wife being a cousin of Mrs. Herman Minter. He has several children all of whom are living with his father in the eastern part of the state, save a daughter Rosa in Omaha.

No effort was made to find him last night for the reason that upon reaching home and finding that Herring had not preceded him Mr. Heppner concluded that he had driven back to town rather than risk the drive at night. Mr. Herring had not been drinking and as the moon was shining the accident seems almost inexplicable. Mr. Heppner who was perhaps, Mr. Herring's most intimate friend in Denison tells us that he was a good worker and a straightforward man. He had been a drinker but for the past few months he had quit the habit entirely.

The accident was a very sad one and his many friends express deep regret at Mr. Herring's untimely death.

## J SCHOOR SELLS

Des Moines Parties Buy His  
Harness Shop.

EMIL SEMMANN THE BUYER.

Des Moines Wholesale Invest in Den-  
ison. Will Establish Large Plant  
Here in Near Future.

The John Schnoor harness shop changed hands last week although possession will not be given until about December 1st. The purchasers are Des Moines parties who have had long experience in the business as manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers.

Mr. H. G. Semmann is the head of the firm and his son Emil Semmann will have charge of the Denison plant.

The Schnoor business will be made the nucleus of a large concern which it is hoped to build up in Denison.

The present location will be occupied at present but the firm is already looking for a new location where a manufacturing plant can be established. From all appearances the coming of this new firm means much to Denison as it will add materially to the payroll of Denison laboring men. Mr. John Schnoor at first announced that the sale would not mean that he would leave Denison but he has received flattering offers from Omaha parties and he may move to that city the first of the year, should he leave Denison a vacancy would be created on the council from the Third Ward.

The REVIEW welcomes the new firm to Denison and wishes it prosperity and the fulfillment of its hope to build up in this city a large plant that shall bring new business to our city and give added employment to our people.

**GARMAN GIVES UP LEASE.**

Mr. Garman Will Not Operate the Lun-  
ey Mills and the Lease is Cancelled.

Some three weeks ago it was announced that Mr. W. L. Garman had leased the Luney mills of the Independence owners, and that the mills would soon be started. Mr. Garman came to Denison, employed Mr. W. H. Rule as miller, purchased grain and made formal announcement that he would at once enter the mill and elevator business here. The news was welcomed by many and there was every indication that the business would be a prosperous one from the start. When the trial run was made, however, Mr. Garman claims that it developed that the mills had not been placed in first class repair and would not turn out the grade of flour guaranteed by the owners. The mill expert Mr. Russell, employed by the Independence parties, claimed that the mills were in good condition, save for some minor repairs which would be incident to starting any machinery that had been long idle. For a time it seemed that a law suit would result. Mr. Menagh and other grain dealers were enjoined from buying grain of Mr. Garman and the Northwestern was enjoined from moving any grain for him. Mr. Garman preferred to pay damages rather than to stand a suit, and settled by the payment of \$750, and was released from the lease. We do not know the merits of the matter and do not wish to say anything prejudicial to any of the parties interested. Mr. Garman made a good impression on the business men who met him, and it is regretted that the mill is to remain idle. The mill owners claim that the fault was not with the mills but that Mr. Garman found the competition much more aggressive than he had anticipated and that he feared to continue the venture on that account. Later it was reported that Mr. George Menagh had purchased the property, but this report was specifically denied.
