By the terms of the will the contestant loses all but \$5.00 of her legacy the remainder going to defray the expense of the contest. The case will probably be appealed. Mrs. Klinkefus the widow has decided to claim her right of dower instead of accepting the provisions of the will. This will necessitate a division of the property which consists of a farm in Dallas county, a small farm in Shelby county and town property in Astor.

Referee Wheeler heard the closing arguments in the Poitevin-Binnall case in which the title of 200 acres of land is in dispute. It is reported that the referee has handed down a decision for the plaintiff. This has been a hard fought case the details of which are well known. It is reported further that this case will be appealed to the supreme court.

Eldora Man Arrested. Charged With Bunco Game With Farmers.

Geo W Sumner was arrested by Sheriff Meehan at Eldora last week, being charged by indictment with having obtained the signatures of Ed. Downey and W. H. Brookelsby through fraud.

Sumner went to West Side as an agent for "The Animals Friend Co." of Eldora. He met Ed Downey, the tall sycamore of Jackson township and persuaded him to become a local agent for the remedies and promised 40 per cent commission.

Downey signed what he believed to be an agent's contract but what turned up later as an order for a large quantity of goods which were delivered later, payment was demanded and suit was brought in Hardin county. Downey fought the case both in the justice and district courts. It was his testimony together with that of W. H. Brookelsby, who signed a similar paper which led to the indictment. Sumner gave bond for \$1000 for his appearance at the next term of court.
