During the last week of his life he grew weaker and it was seen by the loved ones who so faithfully watched at his bedside that end was near, which came and the sufferer passed away into the sweet sleep that knows no awaking in this world. His large circle of friends and neighbors of many years will regret his early decease. The funeral services were held from the M. E. church the remains were laid to rest in the Odebolt cemetery. Mr. Beck has two sisters residing in this locality, Mrs. John Larson and Mrs. Chas. Bergren, a brother in Denison and a sister in Odebolt.
