PLAYED AN EVEN GAME

Denison and Carroll High Schools Have Exciting Game on Thanksgiving Day.

Carroll and Denison again played foot ball Thanksgiving day. Neither side was able to score. Carroll outweighed Denison slightly and Denison was further handicapped by the absence of Searl at left half. Denison was in far better physical condition and used no substitutes. Capt. Bowen won the toss and chose to defend the north goal. Denison kicked. After losing the ball several times on downs Carroll tried a place kick from the 25 yard line which was blocked by Lally. Denison soon lost the ball on downs, but braced and took the ball on her three-yard line. Redenbaugh and Clarke on two plays carried the ball back to the fifty-yard line. Denison was again held and Kuhl punted. The half ended with the ball near the center of the field.

On the kick-off in the second half Kuhl returned the ball about twenty yards. Both teams now punted frequently and were penalized each fifteen yards for the quarter back, carrying the ball without first going five yards out. Quarterback Nicholson was only once thrown for a loss on his runs. Denison lost her only chance to score when Clarke stumbled and fell with a clear field ahead of him.

The half ended with the ball in Denison's possession on her own twenty five-yard line.

This game closed a much more successful season than last year. The team will be the same for next year with the exception of Lally at left guard and Reiter at right half. A slightly sprained knee was the only injury received by any member of the team this season.




