A SAD DEATH.
The funeral of Mrs. John Epsen of Kenwood, occurred on Tuesday Dec. 5th, interment being made in the Lutheran cemetery at Denison. Rev. H. Wendt of Dunlap, was the officiating clergyman.

THE LECTURE.
Dr. Leon Harrison of St. Louis, gave his great lecture, "A Plea for Shylock," to a full house on Tuesday night. A great deal was expected of the learned Rabbi and he fulfilled the expectations of his hearers and held his audience to the close.

Dr. Harrison has a vein of humor that helped to brighten the tragic and gloomy theme, the treatment of the Jews.

The story of Shylock is a story thoroughly symbolic of the treatment of the Jews, but, alas, the whole sale killing of the Jews today is not a story, but an awful truth. Dr. Harrison was fair and just and said nothing that could give rise to feeling in speaking of the treatment of his race though it must be difficult for any Jew to speak calmly upon the awful murders committed. Dr. Harrison played the insurance sharke, who rob the dead and said nothing would afford him more pleasure than to see them in prison. His tributes to Roosevelt, Hay and Lincoln were beautiful and just.

Mrs. J. B. Romans presented the speaker in a most felicitous and charming little speech. Mrs. Roman's gift of saying the right thing at the right time was never better displayed.

Dr. Harrison said he found his audience delightfully sympathetic and responsive to his lecture, saying he used to think little towns meant little minds, but he had found he was mistaken. Dr. Harrison, after the lecture, complimented Mrs. Romans' introduction, saying he was seldom so gracefully presented.

The lecture course is a great success.
