FRESH HAZING AT ANNAPOLIS

Midshipman Kimbrough is Carried to Hospital Unconscious.

Annapolis, Md., Dec. 14.--Notwithstanding the testimony of witnesses before the Meriwether court-martial to the effect that hazing is no longer practiced at the naval academy, a case occurred there last night. The victim was Midshipman Jordan Pettus Kimbrough of Germantown, Tenn. Last week he was called before a board of officers, now in session at the academy, in regard to hazing, fighting and similar practices and compelled to answer certain questions. It is said he had also told some relatives that he had been hazed and that the relatives laid the matter before the authorities. The hazing was on account of these two things. Midshipman Kimbrough was compelled to stand on his head, on his feet, and then on his head again, repeating this process for ten minutes continuously. At the end of the time he fainted and was left in that condition by the hazers. Later he was found by his roommate, still unconscious. He was carried to the hospital, but is now doing well.

Brazilian Squadron Puts to Sea

Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Dec. 14.--It was officially announced in the chamber of deputies that the Panther incident had not been made the subject of an official communication by the Brazilian ambassador at Washington to the state department. The foreign minister said the Brazilian squadron had put to sea for maneuvers and not for the purpose of making a demonstration.

Conference on Divorce Question

New York, Dec. 14.--To define as far as possible the position of religious bodies regarding marriage and divorce, representatives of all the Protestant denominations met in conference here. The views of the members of the conference will be transmitted to the interstate conference on marriage and divorce to be held in Washington on Feb. 19.

Supervisors Elect Officers

Omaha, Dec. 14.--By unanimous vote these officers were chosen for the ensuing year by the Nebraska Association of County Commissioners and Supervisors at their second day's session: President, P. F. Kennedy of York; vice president, Jacob Wooster of Adams; secretary, E. D. Beach of Exeter; treasurer, P. J. Trainer of Omaha.

Two Children Burned to Death

Lead, S. D., Dec. 14.--The two motherless children, aged two and four years, of Matt Dapso were burned to death near Hanna, ten miles from Lead, the cabin taking fire during the absence of the father.

ABE HUMMEL ON TRIAL

New York Lawyer Accused of Securing Perjured Testimony.

New York, Dec. 14.--Abraham H. Hummel, the attorney, was placed on trial before Justice Rogers in the criminal branch of the supreme court on the charges of conspiracy and subornation of perjury in connection with the Dodge-Morse divorce case and when court adjourned only four jurors had been selected. Counsel for the accused lawyer made an effort to have the trial delayed, but Justice Rogers overruled all the various motions having that end in view. During the course of arguments Assistant District Attorney Rand, who is in charge of the prosecution of the case, made the assertion that efforts had been made by the "other side" to kill Charles F. Dodge, the most important witness against Hummel. Mr. Rand said it was necessary to guard Dodge constantly. He urged this as one reason for an early hearing of the case.

HEARST CANNOT HAVE RECOUNT

Court of Appeals Decides It Cannot Order Opening of Ballot Boxes.

Albany, N. Y., Dec. 14.--The court of appeals in a decision handed down in the New York city ballot box case sustains the contention of counsel for Mayor George B. McClellan and denies that of attorneys for William R. Hearst and his colleagues on the municipal ownership league ticket. The court holds, as was argued by former Chief Justice Parker and his associates, that the courts have no power under the election law to order by mandamus the opening of the ballot boxes and a recount and canvass of ballots.

New York, Dec. 14.--W. R. Hearst's counsel announced that an appeal would be made to the legislature during the first week of its meeting in January for a bill providing specifically for a recount of all the ballots cast in the recent election. This is regarded as the most direct course to pursue, as it is said, that further court proceedings, through quo warranto, would be slow and tedious.

Catholic Church Extension Society

Chicago, Dec. 14.--A complete organization of the Catholic Church Extension society, which represents the most important missionary movement ever undertaken in the interest of the Roman Catholic church in the United States, was perfected here at a meeting of prominent Catholic clergymen and laymen at the residence of Archbishop Quigley. A constitution was adopted, officers elected and a board of governors, of which Archbishop Quigley is chairman, was chosen. The headquarters of the society will be at Lapeer, Mich., and it will be incorporated under the laws of that state.

San Jose, Costa Rica, Dec. 14.--The schooner Florencia, while on her voyage from Bluefields, Nicaragua, to Port Limon, Costa Rica, was wrecked. Among those lost were Frederick M. H. Wood, British consul at Port Limon; two Americans, John Tibant and W. A. Rather, the latter from Texas, and three sailors. One passenger and two sailors were rescued.

Honolulu, Dec. 14.--Word has been received here that President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft have approved the bond issue for a territorial loan of \$750,000, despite the protest sent to Washington by Senator McCandless and others. The bonds will now be immediately offered for private sale here and in New York.
