Forty Choice Short Horns Will Be Offered For Sale by C. A. Saunders at Manilla.

Mr. C. A. Saunders of Manilla who has won national fame as a breeder of thorough-bred short-horn cattle announces a sale of forty head of his finest and choicest stock at the Greely Stock Farm near Manilla on Tuesday, Jan. 9th. Mr. Saunders has a large sale pavillion, his free lunches are famous and he makes every possible provision for the comfort of his guests who come from far and near.
