

IT WAS A GRAND SUCCESS

Dunlap Poultry Show Seems to Have Given Satisfaction to Every Body.

The poultry show closed last Friday evening after one of the most successful exhibits ever given by a new organization. Old chicken fanciers, who have attended all kinds of shows, said it was as good an initial poultry show as they ever attended, which goes to show that the management to make it a success will be awarded by a vastly larger number of entries next year. WILL IT AFFECT CRAWFORD?

The taking of the census last year and the falling off in population which it showed or purports to show in Harrison county has brought up quite an interesting discussion that is of decided interest to those officials whose salaries are affected thereby. The recorder's office is the one most affected as the difference of one in population makes a difference of \$300.00 in salary, thus, if the population is less than 25,000 the recorder's salary is only \$1200.00 a year, but if the population is 25,000 the salary is \$1500 a year. The question now is when does the increase or reduction begin? The executive council has sent out a census bulletin which gives the population of this county as less than 25,000, but it is maintained that that bulletin is not the official publication that is required by chapter 8 of the acts of 30th General Assembly which says the census shall be published in a book to be known as "The Census of Iowa," and when the printing of that book is completed the secretary of state shall certify to it and the date of such certificate shall be the date of such publication, as evidence. That book has not been issued yet. When it is issued must the reduced salary of the recorder and auditor of this county begin? Or will this reduction not go into effect until next January? When to reduce is the question.—Logan Observer.
