Judge F. M. Powers Starts the Work Briskly.

ASSIGNMENT OF THE CASES

Neddemeyer and Jordan Cases Will Claim Much Attention Next Week. Petit Jurors to Report Monday.

District Court has been in session this week with Judge F. M. Powers on the bench. Adjournment was taken today until Monday. The following is a brief report of the business done:

In the case of J. G. Shoemaker vs. Franz Miller, judgment for plaintiff for \$182.00 int. 8 per cent from Jan. 5, 1905.

A STORE ASSIGNS

Bamford Stock in Receiver's Hands for Benefit of Creditors.

THE END OF HARD STRUGGLE

Mr. Bamford Estimates that Debts Will Be Fully Paid—E. W. Pierce, Receiver Now in Possession.

On Wednesday the M. M. Bamford stock passed into the hands of E. W. Pierce, receiver. The auction sale proceeded as advertised and but few of the bargain hunters who crowded the store knew that any change had taken place. Today the store is closed and an invoice is being taken under the direction of the receiver. Mr. Pierce tells us that he will close out the stock as soon as possible, in bulk if a reasonable price is offered, if not the goods will be offered at retail under a receivers sale. The indebtedness amounts to about \$6000 and Mr. Bamford estimates the stock at from \$8000 to \$9000. It is usual in such cases that the total indebtedness amounts to more than at first thought, and that when sold at forced sale stock does not bring as much as expected, nevertheless the stock is said to be in fine condition. Mr. Pierce states that the cost of the receivership will be made as low as possible and it is hoped to pay dollar for dollar.

There will doubtless be many critics, but is the Review's opinion that Mr. and Mrs. Bamford have done their best since coming to Denison to make their business a success, they have worked early and late and Mr. Bamford has worked under the serious handicap of ill health. While it has been feared for some time that the store was laboring under difficulties the news of the receivership caused quite a sensation and is much regretted by all of our business men. Since early in the fall Mr. Bamford has been anxious to close out the business and yesterday when creditors from St. Joseph, and Kansas City became importunate it was decided that the receivership was the best solution of the problem. Mr. Bamford tells us that he has accepted a position as traveling salesman for Wise and Stern of Chicago, and commences work on February 1st. The store was handicapped from the start by limited capital and by the fact that the dry goods trade of Denison while limited to but few stores is subject to the

keenest competition and that the prevailing prices in these lines are very low. For our part we wish Mr. and Mrs. Bamford well and hope that they may succeed in the future, it is also our hope that the various creditors may realize well on their claims and that the normal trade conditions of our city may not be greatly disturbed.

W. T. Perkins Urged by Arctic Business Men.

WELL KNOWN IN DENISON

Man of Exceptional Ability and Absolute Integrity. Denison Friends Wish him Success

Col. W. T. Perkins of Nome, Alaska, is being urged for appointment as Governor of that far northern territory, and it is the sincere hope of his many Denison friends that his candidacy will be successful. He is well known here as a gentleman of probity, character and ability.

He is a son-in-law of Hon. H. C. Laub of Denison, Iowa, his wife being Katharine Laub.

Mr. Perkins is a native of New Hampshire. He was graduated at Bates college, Maine, and subsequently from the University of Michigan college of Law. He was for a number of years a resident of Bismarck, North Dakota, where he practiced law. He held the office of County Superintendent of Burleigh county, North Dakota, for six or seven terms. He was also president of the State Teacher's Association of North Dakota. He has been a resident of the Klondike and Alaska for seven or eight years, at first residing at Dawson and subsequently removing to Nome, where he now lives. He is the Nome representative of the Northwestern Commercial Company, a trading and transportation company with headquarters at Seattle, with a capital of a million dollars. M. Perkins is Auditor of said company. He is one of the best known and most popular men in Alaska. Several years ago he was Grand Chief of the Arctic Brotherhood, the leading Alaskan fraternity. He was a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago from the Territorial of Alaska and was also a delegate to the recent Alaskan Territory convention which selected delegates to Congress.

When President Roosevelt visited Seattle and the Pacific coast he was entertained by the Alaska Club. Col. Perkins was chairman of the executive committee of said organization and presided at the banquet tendered to President Roosevelt.

Mr. Perkins has been Grand Master of the Masons of North Dakota as well as Eminent Grand Commander of

the Knights Templar. He is a thirty-third degree Mason, having received this honorary distinction only recently.

The progressive business element of Alaska is a unit in favor of the appointment of Mr. Perkins. The present incumbent, Governor Brady, was appointed through the influence of the Missionary societies when Alaska was simply regarded as a Missionary post, the care of the Indians being the chief business of the Governor.

Since the discovery of gold and the wonderful expansion of trade in the territory, the business interests are demanding a business Governor; and consequently they are in favor of Col. Perkins.

Secretary Shaw, Senator Allison, Senator Frye, Senator Dolliver, Major Lacey, Senator Lodge and many other prominent men are urging the candidacy of Col. Perkins.

A FINE ADDRESS.

The Oelwein Register speaking of the recent Pythian convention in that city, says, that "B. I. Salinger of Carroll and C. F. Kuehule are two of a kind and are both instructive and entertaining. Mr. Kuehule responded to the toast, "Outlook for 1906," and in his talk he "dipped into the future far as human eye may see," and predicted the continued rapid and substantial growth of Iowa Pythianism. This state will soon be entitled to five representatives in the supreme lodge. He told some new stories that were appreciated."


