

REST FOR THE WEARY.

Mrs. H. W. Moeller After Long Illness, Bravely borne, Passes to Her Reward.

After many months of failing health Mrs. Alice Watson Moeller passed from the scenes of earth at her home in Denison, on Monday morning, Jan. 29th, 1906. She was nearly thirty-three years of age, having been born at Lyons, Clinton county, Iowa, Feb. 10, 1873. She removed with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Watson to Crawford county, at the age of seventeen, and was married to Henry W. Moeller on Sept. 22, 1898. This union was blessed with three children, two boys, Ervin and Lowell, aged seven and five who survive her, and an infant daughter who died last spring. After several years residence in South Dakota, Mrs. Moeller returned to the scenes of her youth and acquaintances to spend her last months. Naturally clinging to this life with its attractive powers of home and loved objects of affection, she made an heroic struggle against insidious disease. But it was an unequal contest, and the wavering balances went against prayer and longing. As the mists of the darkened valley obscured her vision she clung earnestly to the hands of the loved ones who surrounded her pillow, and yet we firmly believe she was graciously sustained amid the swellings of Jordan by the unseen, yet Omnipotent friend and Saviour. In early life Mrs. Moeller had accepted the gospel of Christ and for a number of years had been a communicant in the Presbyterian church. The funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon at the residence, in charge of the local Castle of the Knights of Pythias, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. A. G. Martyn, her former pastor, assisted by a choir of singers, when by prayer, and song and address tribute was paid to her memory and the bereaved ones commended to God and the word of His grace.

Mrs. Moeller was a brave little woman, a tender mother, an affectionate wife, a loving daughter. She battled against death not for her own sake alone, but for the little ones who would be left motherless and the husband, the parents, and the brothers and sisters who would be left to mourn. She faced the near approach of death with courage, patience and eyes with cheerfulness, and her boys will carry with them not the picture of a helpless, hopeless, invalid, but the smiling, loving, tender face of the mother who to the very end strove with all her power to make them happy. Our hearts go out in sympathy to the little ones and to the devoted husband, who since her illness has made her comfort and well being his first object in life.

ACCIDENT CAUSED DEATH

Mrs. Lorenzen of Goodrich township Died from Injuries Received in a Fall Last Week

Mrs. Amalie Christine Lorenzen one of the pioneer German mothers of the county died on Sunday from the effects of a fall reported in last week's Review. The injury to her hip was a very severe one and being infirm and aged she failed to rally from the shock and suffering. Mrs. Lorenzen had lived nearly thirty years in this county. She was a woman of great beauty of character and was beloved by a wide circle of friends.

The sympathy of all goes out to her children in their great grief.

Mrs. Amalie Christine Lorenzen was born Feb. 9, 1832, at Horschall, Schleswig-Holstein, Germany. Died Jan. 2, 1906, at the home of her daughter Mrs. Henry Boyens, in Goodrich township, Crawford county, Iowa.

She was married to Lorenz B. Lorenzen in 1852, and they together came to America in 1873 and lived in Clinton county, Iowa for three years when they moved to Crawford county and lived in Hanover and Goodrich townships.

Her husband died a little over two years ago. She leaves three children, A. B. Lorenzen of Denison; Mrs. Jurgen Petersen of Hanover township and Mrs. Henry Boyens of Goodrich township; numerous grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

The funeral service took place at the home of Mrs. Boyens on Tuesday, Jan. 30th, Rev. F. Runge officiating and the remains were laid to rest in the Nissen cemetery. A large number of friends and relatives attested their affection and esteem for her memory by their presence at the obsequies.
