REVIEW'S MARKET LETTER.

South Omaha, March 13, 1906. The run of cattle during the past week has been moderate. The quality as a rule has been getting considerably better and top prices show quite an improvement over a couple of weeks ago. The general steer market has been strong and active and prices are now 15 to 20c higher than one week ago today. Top this week was reached today when \$5.60 was obtained for a good lot of pretty well fattened steers. This is the highest price for a load bunch during this season. The bulk of the pretty fair kinds of steers are selling at \$4.75 to \$5.25. The butcher stock market has also been in very fair shape, and anything in cows and heifers has been selling at pretty good prices. Choice well fattened heifers are selling at the present time at \$4.40 to \$4.60; choice thick-fat cows \$3.85 to \$4.25; good cows \$3.40 to \$3.75; fair cows \$3.00 to \$3.35; canners and cutters \$2.00 to \$3.00.

The demand for heavy weight steers suitable for feeding purposes has continued strong and active. However, the inquiry for light and medium steers has abated materially, and anything of this sort is any where from 25 to 50c lower than a week or ten days ago. Good to choice heavy feeders are selling at \$4.25 to \$4.50; fair to good \$3.90 to \$4.25; good to choice light and medium steers \$4.00 to \$4.25; fair to good \$3.65 to \$4.00. The trend of the hog trade has been rather weak during the past ten days, and prices today on a shade stronger basis are about a dime lower than one week ago. The bulk sold today at \$6.07 1/2 to \$6.15 with tops at \$6.20. Indications favor only moderate offerings, but considering present high prices believe it is advisable to let marketable stock come along.
