## Hurrah For Good Old Denison

Hotel, Opera House and Hospital Assured by the Action of Denison Capitalists.

## OVER \$20,000 PLEDGED TODAY.

Committee Appointed by Commercial Club Takes Action with Magnificent Results.

Forty Thousand Dollar Hotel will be Built on Wilson House Corner--Twenty Thousand Dollar Opera House on Present Opera House Location and Ten Thousand Dollars for Denison's Hospital.

All of Denison's Pride and Patriotism and Good Business Sense Must Now Join in to Complete the Work So Splendidly Begun. With These Improvements Denison Will Jump Into the Class of Important Cities of Iowa.

Once more the capitalists of Denison have come to the rescue and have shown that they have the welfare of Denison at heart. Today the committee of five, E. Gulick, Geo. Naeve, C. L. Voss, Sears McHenry, and J. B. Romans met. The result of the meeting was that before they adjourned it was decided that the three great projects for the improvement of Denison should go hand in hand. All jealousies about location were dropped and the members of the committee and others of the enterprising capitalists of Denison went down in their pockets to the tune of more than twenty thousand dollars to assure the success of the projects. There is still much work

to be done, still much money to raise, but it is impossible that failure can come after such a magnificent start. Every business man, every citizen of Denison is interested. Every one should take just as much stock in the new concerns as he possible can. Not the least but the most should be the watch-word. The plans

as contemplated by the committee and by the subscribers to the stock, consist, first of the erection of a fine, fireproof, \$40,000 hotel on the site of the old Wilson house. This to be done this year. Second, the erection of a \$20,000 Opera House on the site of the present opera house, providing the location can be secured at

a reasonable figure. This work to be commenced as soon as the hotel is completed. Third, the immediate completion and equipment of the Denison Hospital already under way. The cost of this improvement to be about \$10,000.00. This is glorious news for Denison. It ought to awake the pride and loyalty of every citizen. The following are those who have subscribed \$2,000 for the Hotel, \$500 for the Opera House, and \$500 for the Hospital, E. Gulick, Geo. Naeve, C. L. Voss, W. A. McHenry, Chas. Taber, Secretary Shaw, Congressman P. Conner, and Mr. L. Cornwell have already signified their willingness to join with the others and may be counted on for equal amounts, making a total of \$24,000.00. Of the other prominent business men some have already signified their intention of standing by the projects and there are some who have not been seen who never yet have failed to co-operate generously for Denison's well fare. There can be no doubt of success—Hurrah for Denison.

Secretary Leslie M. Shaw returned to Denison on Saturday evening and for two days at least enjoyed a return to the "simple life". Sunday was spent quietly at home and at church while on Monday the Secretary exercised his right of suffrage, voting at the Merrill wagon shop in the first ward. This year the secretary's vote was unchallenged. The remainder of Monday was spent in visiting with the old friends, discussing, arguing and shaking hands just in the same old way. On Sunday evening Mr. Shaw addressed a magnificent union meeting at the Methodist church, occupying the pulpit from which for so many years he directed the affairs of the Methodist Sunday school. Mr. Shaw spoke to the young men and directed his remarks toward the growing tendency to impute dishonesty to all men whether in public or business life. He maintained that the standards of the Nation today were higher than ever before and that the wholesale denunciations indulged in by many writers and speakers did great injustice to honorable and upright men and were fast undermining the righteous faith of the people in our institutions. Mr. Shaw spoke in the familiar way in which one might to old friends and neighbors and it was for this reason that he particularly requested that no attempt be made in the papers to quote from his remarks. We believe under the circumstances that his wish should be respected. It was a heart to heart talk from one old friend to other old friends and as such it has the right to be labelled "confidential".


