### Manilla

Last Sunday morning occurred the death of Mrs. L. G. Miller who has been in poor health for the last year. She spent several months last fall at Bonesteel, Neb., where she doctored with a physician at that point and every one thought she was much improved up till last Thursday when she was taken violently worse and it was evident from that time on that the end was near. The funeral took place at the M. E. church last Tuesday morning and the remains were laid to rest at Kirkman, Iowa, by the side of her mother who preceded her in August, 1904. Mrs. Miller came to Manilla when she was a girl of 14 years and finished her school life in the Manilla schools during which time she made for herself a wide circle of friends. Mrs. Miller leaves a husband, one little girl, a father, two brothers and two sisters to mourn her loss.

Manilla's sensation this week was the arrest and summary conviction of Hans Sieck on the charge of disturbing the peace. Hans got quite en-

thusiastic on Saturday about the approaching city election. Later in the afternoon he was arrested under an information made by F. C. Boeck and taken before Mayor Grey. When arrested Sieck was armed but he claimed that he was about to take his rifle and revolver to the repair shop.

Mayor Grey set the hearing at 8 p. m. and required a bond of \$1000 for his appearance which was promptly furnished by A. Bahls a prominent farmer living near Manilla. At the hearing Sieck pleaded not guilty but the mayor thought differently and gave him 10 days in the county jail and insisted that he be taken to Denison that night. Mr. Sieck's friends claim that no testimony was taken and that he was not allowed to file an appeal bond. Mayor Grey claims that testimony was heard in the case and that no notice of appeal was filed nor bond offered. Sieck was hustled off to Denison but his friends were hot on his trail. They arrived in Denison soon after the officers and their prisoner, and appeared before the county clerk with whom they filed an appeal bond for \$1000 whereupon Sieck was at once released, returning to Manilla on Sunday morning much to the joy of his family and friends. Much feeling exists in the case and it found expression in the city election.

The city election turned out to be a one-sided affair but it was occasion of considerable strife. The present administration was turned down by the voters, almost three to one. There were two tickets in the field, the People's and the Citizen's. The following shows the two tickets and the results. Peoples ticket. For Mayor, P. C. Grey, 50; Councilman, J. E. McCracken 54, Chas. Schroeder 45; Clerk, Ed Denny, 53; Treasurer, Frank Strauser, 78; Assessor, John Schram, 88. Citizen's ticket. For Mayor, M. J. McNertney 131; Councilman, O. E. Snider, 141, L. L. Hicketh 134; Clerk, C. A. Sykes 129; Treasurer, blank; Assessor, blank. Every body seemed to take off their coats on election day to elect that Citizen's ticket and judging from the result they did it, but the morning after election they all went back to their works as if nothing had happened, and everything promises to go on quietly.

Last Tuesday evening a social was given at the Presbyterian church for the benefit of the Famine Stricken Japanese, quite a sum was raised amounting to almost \$100.
