Dodge, and 14 delegates to attend the senatorial convention for the 34th District of Iowa not yet called, 14 delegates to attend the Judicial convention for the 16th Judicial District of Iowa not yet called and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention. The basis of representation is one delegate for each precinct or township and one delegate for each 15 votes or major fraction thereof cast for W. B. Martin Secretary of State in 1904. Rural Delivery May Soon be Extended to Every Farmer in Crawford.

The postmaster at Denison has received a request from the Postoffice department for a map of Crawford county and one of the excellent Review maps has been forwarded. The map was requested in order that the matter of establishing county service in Crawford might be investigated. This will mean quite an addition in the number of carriers and that every farmer in Crawford county will be accommodated. It is unlikely that any changes in the present routes will be considered so long as this matter of county service is pending.

GOOD FOR EAST BOYER

Takes Advanced Step By Remitting Tax Where King Drag is Used

The trustees of East Boyer township set the pace for the other townships of the county this week when they voted that the poll tax on any farmer shall be remitted if he works not less than eighty rods of road by the King drag system during the coming year. We believe East Boyer will get better returns in this way than in any other and that when once adopted the plan will not be abandoned. We know of a piece of road in Coon Grove that has been in good condition all this spring on account of the drag system when the roads on each side of it were hub deep with mud. The town folks have no license to talk however as the King drag used on our roads last week would have been of immense benefit but not a thing was done. East Boyer is certainly to be congratulated and we shall look for great improvement in the roads of that up-to-date township.

EDITOR KEITH IS DEAD

Former Bulletin Editor Dies In Butte Montana Of Heart Failure

A. B. Keith, practically the founder to the Denison Bulletin and the man who was identified with all its earlier history died on Saturday last at his home in Butte Montana. His sudden death was due to heart failure. Mr. Keith came to Denison in the seventies and was for many years the head of the Bulletin. It was in the days of personal journalism of the most bitter kind, and the Review and the Bulletin never had a kindly word to say for each other. Mr. Keith was a master of sarcasm and invective, but he was also a good news-gatherer and under him the Bulletin saw its best days. The passing of the years has softened the impression of our childhood days concerning him and we know now that he was a man of many brilliant parts. Finally however he lost his hold upon the democratic party of the county and he sold his paper to Henry A. Cook. He moved to Montana and was identified with the publication of different newspapers and became one of the influential men of that state. After leaving Denison he identified himself with the republican party and remained with that party during the remainder of his life. We have at hand no adequate account of his life but we would send our message of sympathy to his loved ones and to his friends who were many.

The St. Paul Dispatch says of his death. A. B. Keith, one of the most prominent newspaper men in the Northwest, is dead at Butte of heart disease. Mr. Keith was a native of Maine and 51 years old. He edited a paper at Denison, Iowa and afterward Des Moines Daily Mail. He came to Helena as editor of the Helena Journal, owned by a son of President Harrison, and later was a candidate for state auditor. He has since then edited the Helena Herald Butte Inter-Mountain and Butte Miner. He is survived by a wife and five children. He was prominently connected with the Woodmen, being a candidate for head consul to succeed Falkenberg upon the latter's death. Since leaving Senator Clark's paper last year he has engaged in mining and Woodmen work.
