SUCCESS IN SIGHT.

FORTY THOUSAND IS RAISED.

Sentiment Exists That all Should be Built or Whole Project Dropped. Next Few Days Will Tell.

More than forty thousand dollars have now been subscribed for the Hotel Opera House and Hospital. Fifty thousand is the least that can secure success. At the meeting of the Commercial Club last night a resolution was passed that the success of all three projects should be assured before any should be commenced. The opera house is to wait a year, but the funds for its erection must be subscribed before anything can be done. WILL VOTE FOR GAS.

Two Propositions Will Probably be Submitted.

GAS PLANT IS ASSURED.

City Council will Submit Franchises to the Vote of the People—Plant is Certain.

For the past few weeks the city council has been struggling with the gas proposition. The Denison Electric Light Co. has made a proposition as has also the firm of Nicholls and Kelly. The council expects to take final action on the matter next Friday night and it is said that both propositions will be submitted to a vote of the people. There can be no doubt but that one or the other of the propositions will be accepted and that Denison will have a first class gas plant before the end of another year.

This will mean the expenditure of a considerable amount for labor and will add greatly to the boom that Denison is to enjoy should the Hotel and other projects go through. This is to be the banner year in Denison's history. The two franchises will be printed in full when the question is submitted and there will be opportunity for full discussion. At this time the Review does not care to enter into the merits of the propositions, except to say that it is strongly in favor of anything which will build up Denison.

FIVE CELEBRATIONS.

Commercial Club Proposes Plans for Summer Holidays.

MEMORIAL DAY IS FIRST.

Fourth Of July, Old Settlers Picnic, German Day, and Harvest Festival. All to be Observed

The Commercial Club has decided to recommend a series of five public holidays for the summer season in Denison. It is felt that this is better than to have a street fair lasting for several days when a run of bad weather may spoil all the plans. In the first place it was decided to offer assistance to the old soldiers for the proper observance of Memorial Day. For the past few years this great patriot day while sacredly kept by the G. A. R. and kindred organizations, has not been as generally observed as it should be. It is the hope to encourage the old soldiers with financial support so that a speaker may be employed, music furnished and the day fittingly observed. There is no thought of degenerating the day into a day of sports. It was further recommended that the Fourth of July be celebrated in the same old glorious style.

It was felt that the day meant too much to all loyal Americans for the date of the celebration to be changed for any commercial consideration.

It is next planned to afford entertainment for the Old Settlers' Picnic. The success of last year has encouraged the merchants and business men to wish to continue to make this one of the great days of the year.

German Day was recommended for the next great holiday. It is but a fair recognition of our splendid German American citizenship and it is hoped that they will take hold of this celebration and make it their very own.

The Harvest Festival is to occur in October and will probably be in the nature of a great barbecue.

In this way public holidays will be provided for each month of the summer season and every one will find opportunity for enjoyment. An executive committee consisting of J. F. Balle, Hugo Gebert, F. W. Meyers,

S. McHenry and G. L. Caswell was appointed to have general supervision over these celebrations, with power to appoint sub-committees.

THE CORN PITH MAN.

Inventor Explains to Commercial Club What Can be Done With Pith.

Inventor Fr. Foote of San Jose, Cal. appeared before the Commercial Club last night and showed some of the wonderful things he can do with corn pith. After an extended explanation of his inventions he asked that a stock company be formed for the purpose of manufacturing corn pith products in Denison. A committee consisting of J. E. Balle, Hugo Gebert and C. J. Salomon was appointed to investigate the matter fully and to report to the club. The members present were much interested in the showing made by Mr. Foote and it is our opinion that if the report of the committee is satisfactory a stock company can easily be formed to put this product on the market. At any rate it appears worthy of investigation and the committee will sift the matter to the bottom. It will mean a great deal to the farmers of this county if what is now a worthless by product could be made of value.

COURT NEWS.

Moore and Conner & Lally appeared for the other parties. The evidence was submitted shortly after dinner and the Judge adjourned Court or the term.
