Crawford County Sunday School Convention.

Last Saturday and Sunday in Dow City the regular annual county Sunday School convention was held. The bad weather interfered somewhat with the attendance but not with the interest and enthusiasm of those present. Despite the rain and storm hundreds of people met together during the two day's session. The State worker, Prof. Manning who travels all over the state attending every county convention held said that this convention was by far the best he had attended in Iowa. Many others expressed themselves in the same way and thought this the best convention they had ever experienced in Crawford. The people of Dow City are to be highly commended for their part in taking care of the visitors with a plenty and the choicest of good things. Her hospitality will long be remembered by those fortunate enough to have been her guests. The program was full of excellent numbers. There were too many of them to even mention all. Prof. Manning's addresses were full of inspiration and sound common sense. Rev. Thuresson's address on Saturday night brought out a large crowd through the rain and all were well repaid by a master effort. Prof. Van Ness made an ideal chairman and gave a splendid talk on the past and future of Sunday School work in Crawford county. The large union Sunday School supervised by Mr. Van Ness and the classes taught by the visitors was a grand success and very efficient as every one from teacher to pupil was put on his best mettle. The visitors who took charge of the classes deserve much praise and credit for their work here. The five department secretaries gave good reports of their department's work during the past year either through talks or by papers sent to be read. These reports showed that more and more interest is being taken and work done along these lines every year. Every one of the incumbent secretaries were reelected for next year. The conundrum class conducted by Prof. Hoffman brought out some very vital and interesting questions and answers. A great deal of wit and wisdom were displayed and an inestimable amount of good received by those taking part. Mr. McHenry's child took sick during the forenoon so he could not be present to conduct the class. During the evening session a round table was given on "Phases of the Sunday School" in five minute talks. Messrs. Thos. Rae, Leon Cassaday, and E. W. Pierce gave pointed and helpful talks along different lines of Sunday School questions which were well received.

Present status Our state apportionment \$41.00 is paid, reports are coming from the Sunday Schools of the county that we may have a complete report to the state all but one of the districts have local organizations through which we are securing our reports, Crawford was ranked a banner county at the state convention, June, 14th, 1905, and was given the olive wood gavel from Jerusalem. There seems to be an exceptional interest in convention and Sunday School work in the majority of our districts. Two or three of them need reorganizing and reviving to quite a degree.

F. L. Hoffman, sec. and Treas. The resolution committee reported as follows and the report was unanimously adopted: Whereas, our county association has derived great benefit from the work of the Lyceum bureau and the system of district conventions, we recommend that the executive committee arrange for a "Tour Party" composed of workers from the county, to conduct institutes and hold mass meetings in the interest of the Sunday School work.

Second: That since a large proportion of the population of our county is not enrolled in any Sunday School, we recommend that a special effort be made to increase the enrollment of our schools through house to house visitation and other methods, each school adding at least one new pupil per month.
