

LATEST SAN FRANCISCO NEWS.

The Review Secures the Latest Report From the Scene of Greatest Catastrophe America Has Ever Known.

Omaha, Neb. April 19, 2.30 p. m. Special to the Review. General Funston reports that two hundred thousand are homeless in San Francisco alone. The town of Santa Rosa is a total wreck, with ten thousand homeless and every business house destroyed. Lieutenant Polis of the Light Artillery probably fatally injured by premature explosion of dynamite used to wreck buildings in the path of fire in San Francisco. The power supply is exhausted and the flames are still beyond control. There is no hope for the City as fire extends to the residence portion and there is no fire protection nor any means of fighting the flames. The soldiers are issuing drinking water to the people. The State University escapes with little damage. The government is rushing food and tents from nearest military depots and the ships of navy have been ordered to render all the possible assistance to the stricken people. The disaster is wide spread. Messengers from different parts of the state tell of wide spread destruction. The towns of Headsburg, Geyserville, Cloverdale, Hopland and Ukiah are reported destroyed. These reports come in from as far west as the coast. Stockton and Fresno report no damage but heavy snocks.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA STRICKEN

The town of Brawley, 120 miles south of Los Angeles was destroyed but this is the only town in the southern part of the state said to have been injured. Telegraph lines are working very irregularly and news comes in round about ways from all affected parts of the state. The identification of the dead is difficult as many are burned beyond recognition. The estimate of one thousand killed is not reliable.

The fire is still raging. Outside cities that sent firemen and apparatus have recalled them as there is no water. Firemen report that city is doomed. From New York comes the report that the fire has reached Nob Hill and that the palatial residences will be destroyed. It is now admitted that the estimate of one thousand killed is underestimated. More than 3000 have been seriously injured. Property loss is placed at \$200,000,000.00. The Senate committee reported an appropriation of \$500,000.00 for relief of sufferers, but the House committee raised the amount to One Million. Reports from other towns in the state are very alarming.

MERCHANTS MEET.

Will Form Organization for Mutual Benefit

Representative Greens of Madison County Delivers Address on Benefits of Organization

MANY MERCHANTS ATTEND

Tuesday the retail merchants of the county held a meeting for the purpose of organizing themselves into an association for their mutual benefit and support. The meeting was well attended not only by the merchants of Denison but by the retailers from nearly every town in the county.

Hon. R. A. Greene who represented Madison county in the last session of the legislature was the speaker of the day and he delivered a convincing address to the merchants concerning the objects of the association and the benefits to be derived from organization. He went into the details of the retail trade and discussed many of the hardships and the impositions the retailer has to stand. These he said could be largely avoided by co-operation, which should not stifle competition but which should be mutually protective.

There was some discussion as to the advisability of organization but it appeared to be the opinion of nearly all present that it would be beneficial and an organization was effected. These officers will hold until the regular election which will occur in July. Sec. Gebert is about to send out invitations to all the retailers of the county to join and a meeting for the further consideration of plans will be held during the fore part of May. The success of the meeting was largely due to the efforts of Mr. O. R. Smith who visited all the towns of the county and got the merchants well interested. He represents the mutual fire insurance feature of the organization. He tells us that nineteen counties of the state are now organized and that the society, if so it may be called is extending rapidly. There will be a state convention held in Sioux City in the near future and Mr. Smith hopes to have wesetrn Iowa well organized before that time.
