Hotel, Opera House and Hospital are Assured

HAVE DECIDED TO GO AHEAD.

With Less Than Three Thousand to Raise the Work will be Commenced It Once

With more than forty seven thousand dollars of stock subscribed the business men feel that there is no need to wait longer and the work of building the hotel and completing the hospital will be commenced at once and if possible pushed to completion this year. It was agreed that the opera house should wait another year.

We understand that the lots for the hotel have already been purchased and that the contractors have been told to go ahead with the erection of the hospital. A meeting of the stockholders was held at the city hall Tuesday evening to discuss the method of incorporation. Mr. Geo. Naeve was chairman and Mr. E. L. Barber secretary of the meeting.

The question under discussion was whether the three enterprises should be incorporated as one or whether the affairs of each should be kept separate. The majority sentiment favored the single corporation as the most economical, the more centralized and as the one that would promote a community of interest among all our citizens. The soliciting committee which has done such splendid work the past few weeks was authorized to draw up an agreement to the joint concern and present it to the individual stockholders for their approval. Such an agreement was at once drawn and was signed by all those present. It is hoped that there will be no objection to this method as it will certainly be the best and fairest for all concerned. The bulk of the subscriptions were made, not for investment purposes but for the good of Denison and all subscribers whether for one fund or the other should share alike. As soon as it is ascertained that this arrangement will be satisfactory a second meeting will be called to proceed with the organization.

We cannot congratulate the citizens of Denison too highly upon the way they have responded in this matter. Already the news has passed throughout the state and Denison is marked as one of the progressive cities. We know of one large institution that is coming to Denison, largely attracted here by the enterprise that has been shown by our business men. More will come. There is no reason why Denison should not become as populous as Fort Dodge or as Waterloo, and it will if the spirit of the past few weeks is maintained. Hurrah for good old Denison.
