Mr. and Mrs. Sibbert and Prof. Van Ness and Miss Van Ness sang "Jesus lover of my Soul," "Asleep in Jesus" and "My Jesus as Thou Wilt" with tenderness of feeling and expression.

In a perfect bower of flowers Mrs. Scriver seemed asleep with a smile of perfect content upon her face. "Asleep in Jesus" was ones' instant thought.

The profusion of beautiful and rare flowers mingled their message of hope and peace with the tears and last farewells.

Among the societies and orders which sent flowers were the Ladies Aid, Penelope club, Mrs. Scriver's Sunday School class, The C. and A. high school classes, the B C club, The City Federation, Girls club, the Sorority in Mt. HE WAS FOUND DEAD

John McSorley of Manilla Found in Field Unconscious

DEATH QUICKLY ENSUES

Heart Failure Causes Sudden Death of Wealthy Manilla Farmer. Funeral Services Tomorrow

Yesterday afternoon neighbors found John McSorley, a wealthy bachelor farmer who lived four miles west of Manilla, lying unconscious in a plowed field on his farm. The neighbors were attracted by seeing his team wandering aimlessly in a clover field, dragging a disc harrow. The track of the disc was followed and it led to a plowed field where the unfortunate man was found unconscious but still alive. A physician was called at once while immediate efforts were made to revive him, but long before the physician had arrived the body of John McSorley was cold in death.

There were no marks on the body to indicate that he had been injured either by a runaway accident or by foul play. The team was not excited, and evidently when their driver fell they walked over to the nearby field of clover. Mr. McSorley had been in Manilla for the week prior to his death. On Tuesday night he stayed with his brother-in-law Frank Slater. He went to his own farm on Wednesday and evidently started to work after dinner. That he had just entered the field is shown by the fact that no work had been done.

Mr. McSorley was a bachelor and was about forty-six years of age. He had numerous relatives in this county, leaving six sisters and one brother to mourn his death. He was accounted well-to-do. On May 8th he called upon a Manilla attorney and had a will drawn, but this he never returned to sign.

The funeral services will be held at the Catholic church in Manilla tomorrow, Friday, afternoon. Stricken thus suddenly in the prime of life he has many friends to mourn his untimely end.

Owing to the death of the beloved member of the club Penelope will not meet again this season.

COUNCIL TAKES ACTION

Passes Resolution For Big Cut On The Balle Hill—Parking Must Go Also.

Last night the city council passed a resolution to establish a new grade on the Balle hill. We think this is the fourth grade that has been established. The new resolution provides for a big cut which includes the parking on both sides of the street. There is much feeling about the matter, and there are charges of bad faith afloat. Some of the prettiest streets of Denison are those where the parkings and walks are above the street level and for our part we think it is working an undue hardship to ask that the parkings on North Main street should be torn up for the fourth time. We hope that some compromise may be affected by which all parties may be satisfied, if not, it promises to be a very expensive matter for the city when the actual work of changing the grade begins.

The street should undoubtedly be cut, but we think it would be better to leave the side walks and parkings alone.

MAY GET FREE DELIVERY.

Denison Postal Receipts Exceed Ten Thousand Dollars.

The receipts of the Denison post-office for the fiscal year ending April 30th, exceeded \$10,000.00. This is the amount of business required before free city delivery may be established. Hon. J. P. Conner has brought the matter to the attention of the authorities and the postmaster is in hope that immediate steps will be taken to make this improvement in our local postal service. Besides being a great convenience to the people it would mean the employment of two or three additional men. It would be well if the business men would take an interest in this matter and push it along.


