REVIEW'S MARKET LETTER.

South Omaha, May 22, 1906.

The cattle market continued in very good shape all last week under the influence of only fairly liberal offerings. The quality of the steer stuff was good and trading as a general thing was active, closing prices being 10 to 15 cents higher than the opening. Top cattle sold at \$5.50 to \$5.65; good kinds of steers \$5.00 to \$5.35; fair to good \$4.60 to \$5.00. The butcher stock trade also held up in good shape, and while there was no material advance, prices for the most part were strong with good active trading for anything desirable. Good to choice cows and heifers are quotable at \$4.00 to \$4.50; fair to good \$3.25 to \$4.00; canners and cutters \$1.75 to \$2.90; veal calves \$5.00 to \$5.75. So far this week the run of cattle has been liberal; trading is a little weaker on best kinds while common and medium grades are fully a dime lower than the close last week.

There is little life to the stocker and feeder trades. Supplies are moderate, and with an indifferent inquiry from the limited number of buyers trade has been more or less draggy and values now are 10 to 15 cents lower than a week ago. Good to choice stockers and feeders are quotable at \$4.35 to \$4.50; fair to good \$3.90 to \$4.25.

One of the heaviest declines in a long time was experienced here yesterday in the hog trade. Chicago reported heavy run and lower market, and trading here was slow and a dime lower. We have 17,000 on sale today, but outside conditions are in better shape and trade here is only a shade lower. The bulk sold at \$6.20 to \$6.25 with top at \$6.30.
