REVIEW'S MARKET LETTER

South Omaha, June 12th, 1906.

The cattle trade closed up with a little better feeling last week and prices showed an advance of about a dime. However, the packers were slow bidders and government investigations have caused them to curtail on supplies, as no doubt their inquiry has been effected materially. The run today is fairly liberal, about 5300 head. The beef trade is generally slow and about a dime lower than the close last week, the most of this decline being noticeable on steer stuff, as the offerings in cows and heifers will not allow of much concession. Good to choice steers are selling at \$5.00 to \$5.40; fair to good \$4.50 to \$5.00; good to choice dry-lot cows and heifers \$4.00 to \$4.50; fair to good \$3.25 to \$3.90; canners and cutters \$1.75 to \$2.85; veal calves \$5.50 to \$6.25; fat bulls \$3.50 to \$4.00.

There has been little call for stockers or feeders the past week, and with the limited offerings there has been but little business in this connection. Prices are fully 25 cents lower than ten days ago and about 75 cents lower than the high time a month ago. Good to choice kinds are selling at \$4.00 to \$4.35; fair to good \$3.65 to \$4.00.

The hog trade last week closed up strong and active with an advance of 10 to 15 cents. Trading was steady yesterday, but a little reaction set in this morning and values are a shade to a nickel lower. The bulk sold at \$6.32½ to \$6.37½ with top at \$6.45.

The Retailers' Journal Chicago, says that the claims of the 25-cent alum baking powders are an imposition, both on the consumer and the retailer. The difference between the cost of manufacture of a 10-cent alum baking powder and a 25-cent one is not distinguishable; in fact, it was stated recently by an officer of the Alum Baking Powder Association that they both come out of the same barrel. The cost to make an alum baking powder is about two cents a pound. When this powder is sold at 25 cents a pound it would not appear to the average consumer as a "high grade baking powder sold at a moderate price," but rather as a very low grade baking powder sold at a high price. The twenty-three cents profit on a two-cent food article is not, however, so important as the fact that the chief ingredient of the 25-cent powder is alum, a mineral acid, well known to be injurious when taken into the stomach.
