

### MUST OBEY THE LAW

Farmers Decide in Favor of Strict Enforcement.

### AUTO OWNERS ARE AGREED.

Law and Order League will Probably Be Formed on a Friendly Basis.

The City hall was well filled on Saturday afternoon at the meeting called to discuss the automobile question in all its phases. Mr. Bradley Lee acted as chairman of the meeting with William Bergsted as secretary. Considerable discussion took place, the automobile drivers claiming that they exercised due care and others claiming that they did not always obey the law.

There is no room for doubt but that the farmers present were in earnest and that a sentiment exists against the use of the machines. Frank Brown took an active part in the meeting and moved that it be the sense of the meeting that automobiles should not be allowed the use of the public highways and that a boycott should be declared against any one owning a machine, and against any one who employs a person owning a machine. This motion carried, a large number of those present not voting. After further discussion it was moved and carried that a set of resolutions embodying these ideas be drafted. A committee consisting of F. D. Brown, B. H. Lee and L. H. Messenbrink was selected to prepare the resolutions. While these were being prepared the large majority left the meeting. The committee was informed that any attempt to organize a boycott would be illegal and the resolves as finally adopted contained only the request that auto owners sell their machines at once. It was the intention to circulate this in the form of a petition to be presented to the auto owners. Later the matter was discussed more freely and the leaders of the movement became convinced that the best method of procedure at present would be the formation of Law and Order League for the strict enforcement of the state law. Farmers, automobilists and business men will all be invited to join this league. The owners of machines not only in Denison but throughout the county will be asked to pledge themselves to obey the law in every particular. It is the further purpose to raise a guarantee fund for the payment of any expense for legitimate prosecution for violations of the law. This fund would be called for pro rata only as money was necessary for such purpose.

It was the understanding when the meeting adjourned that the resolutions should not be pressed pending the formation of the law and order league. We believe it was the sentiment of the leaders of the movement that the league presented the best solution of the difficulty. While the first course might possibly drive local automobiles out of the county it would not affect outside tourists who certainly have less feeling of responsibility. It would engender much hard feeling and any persons handing themselves together for boycott purposes might lay themselves liable to damages.

It was thought that if the local owners pledge themselves to obedience to the law, and further if they contributed to a fund for the prosecution of offenders, they would be interested in seeing that the law was observed by all.

Mr. C. L. Voss had written a letter offering to contribute to such a fund, but the letter was unfortunately forgotten by the chairman until the meeting was about to adjourn.

The meeting accomplished much in the way of bringing about a clearer understanding and we believe it will be productive of much good.

### IOWA AND MINNESOTA GROUND WATERS.

The natural resources of southern Minnesota, Iowa and northern Missouri will not realize their maximum development in agriculture alone, great as this industry has become. The region should be the great manufacturing center of the middle west as it has a central location, excellent railroad facilities and almost innumerable sites favorable for industrial activity. There is however, one important difficulty in those states which, until solved, will hinder or prevent manufacturing development, namely, the lack of good water supply.

It is well known that underlying this region is one of the greatest artesian basins in the United States. In Iowa especially there are many famous wells from 1000 to 3000 feet deep that afford enormous amounts of water flowing at high pressure, so high in some cases that towns have not needed to install pumps to furnish pressure even for firing purposes. Perennial fountains that cost nothing for maintenance can be found in the public squares. Clearly then the great source of water for this country is the ground. There is one fatal defect, however—the water is generally unfit for manufacturing purposes, however satisfactory its quality may be for household use. The majority of the waters contain ingredients that damage manufactured products and corrode or scale steam boilers. Untold thousands of dollars have been wasted in the search for favorable boiler waters and great industrial enterprises have been abandoned because the search was unsuccessful. Nevertheless, there appear here and there throughout the region wells that supply excellent water for all purposes, and this indicates that, were the facts concerning the ground waters properly studied, the depth at which this good water occurs might be determined for each locality.

Through the efforts of several of the Congressman representing the region above indicated, the United States Geological Survey, through its Hydrographic Branch, began some month ago a study of the water bearing strata beneath the surface of the ground in these three states and entered upon a thorough examination of the quality of the water from each of the underground sources. It was found to be purely an interstate problem, the artesian basin not being confined to the state boundaries but extending over all three. Therefore the problem could not be profitably studied by either one of the states. Up to the present time, the sources of many of the bad waters have been definitely located as well as some of the good ones, and it is encouraging to note that apparently in all parts of the region the good waters are available after proper examination has been made of the conditions that prevail. So important has the investigation proved to be that the Geological Survey has recently made an additional appropriation for the work, and field investigations will continue during the present summer and fall, at the end of which it is expected that sufficient data will have been collected to make a report upon the subject. As is usual in such cases this report when printed will be for free distribution.

The economic importance of the work can hardly be overestimated. Cities and towns throughout this region have been obliged to use bad boiler and industrial waters can now look forward to the time when favorable waters will be available and industrial development is likely to proceed with all the speed that the favorable conditions in the regions deserve. The whole investigation presents an instance of the practical value of some lines of government investigation. Here is an interstate problem, never to be well worked out by the individual states interested because the controlling conditions are widespread and it is necessary to consider them all before any great amount of benefit can be obtained.

### SECOND BROOD OF THE CODLIN MOTH

The second brood of the codlin moth often does much damage to the apple crop in Iowa. In northern Iowa this brood will probably begin to hatch about August 10th and southern Iowa about two weeks earlier. Since from 75 per cent to 80 percent of the eggs of this brood are usually laid on the leaves it is important in fighting it that the foliage be thoroughly covered by the spray. The spraying should be done before the eggs hatch. It is best to use Bordeaux mixture with the paris green, or other arsenical poison, as directed in Bulletin No. 85 of the Iowa Experiment Station.

The Station Horticulturist would be pleased to have those who spray their apple orchards for the second brood of the codlin moth leave a few trees unsprayed for comparison with the sprayed trees and report to him the results together with the date of treatment and the kind of spray mixture used.
