Crawford County.

INSTITUTE NEXT WEEK

Two Weeks Session Promises To Be Interesting.

The regular annual session of the Crawford county Institute will be held in Denison commencing on Aug. 13 and continued until Aug. 25. Normal will be held at the college building as will also the lectures. Much new work is to be introduced this year among which are extensive lectures and demonstrations in parliamentary practice by Supt. Fellows of the Denison public schools, drawing by Prof. A. E. Parsons, of the Keokuk schools.

The Normal has this year gone to a great expense to secure the services of Hon. A. E. Winshift, Editor of the Journal of Education, of Boston, and Mr. Winshift is recognized as one of the foremost educational lecturers in the country today. Mr. Winshift will give three lectures a week. These will be given the first part of the week and will be held at the college chapel and are free to the public.

Prof. J. E. Cameron, Instructor in Natural Science in the Cedar Rapids high school who will be well remembered by those attending normal last year, will give on Wednesday and Friday evenings, two illustrated lectures. These lectures are along scientific subjects and all persons interested in these subjects are invited to be present. Admission to these as to the others will be free.

The examinations and rural graduating exercises will be held upon Aug. 24th and 25th. Students graduating at this time will receive diplomas which will entitle them to admission to any high school in Crawford county without examinations. The enrollment this year is expected to reach as high as 225 students making it one of the largest normals ever held in Denison. The teachers heretofore as well as now, have appreciated the interest the people of Denison have taken in their work and hope this year to partially repay their kindness, in securing an excellent program, and sincerely hope the attendance may be large.

DEATH OF CLAUD GRILL.

Claud Grill, a prominent farmer of Goodrich township, a brother of Herman Grill of Denison, and of Jurgan Grill, of Schleswig, died on Tuesday night. Mr. Grill came to this county in the neighborhood of twenty-five years ago, and located about three miles northwest of Deloit, where he has lived ever since. His farm is one of the best in that locality. He became one of the wealthy citizens of the community. His age was fifty-eight years at the time of his death. He left surviving him a wife and five children.

Mr. Grill has been in failing health for some time. He had an extensive acquaintance, and was highly respected by everyone who knew him. Not only his family, but the community in which he lived as well suffer a great loss in his death.

The funeral was held from the family home in Goodrich township this afternoon and the remains laid to rest in the Nissen cemetery.

MORE PETTY MEANNESS

Board Closes Court Room During Carnival Time.

Knowing that many farmers and residents of other towns would be in Denison during carnival week, we are informed that a member of the board of supervisors ordered the court room, the handsomest room in the new court house, be kept locked while the visitors were in town. By what divine right this member of the board thinks he is licensed to keep the people of the county out of his (?) court house we do not know. One of the county officers got the key and let a large number of visitors in, but as soon as it was discovered that the people, the common people, were actually feasting on the boards' private court house they were sent out and the key turned in the lock. Mr. Woodward, representing the contractors said he knew no reason why the court room should not open JUST AS IT HAD BEEN BEFORE THE CARNIVAL. But under orders from the supervisors this room and others were kept locked. There is no excuse for this fresh exhibition of petty meanness and pure cussedness, the member of the board who did it and any member who authorized it ought to be kicked off the board in November.

If the court house belongs to the contractors, the supervisors had no right to order the doors locked, if it belongs to the county it belongs to the people and again this upstart supervisor had no right to keep the people from seeing it.

Again it appears that the board draws the line on the farmers and residents of the other towns. Denison people have had free access to the court house every week day SINCE the Fourth of July but when the people from outside are coming in every thing is done to prevent them from seeing the building their money has paid for.

This is not Denison's fault the people of this city would have been more than glad to have the people see all of the new building.

The whole thing is but another sample of petty meanness.

BIG FIRE NEAR BREA.
