ACCEPT THE CHALLENGE.

Citizens Association Takes up Gauntlet Against Labor Union.

New York, Aug. 5—The challenge issued by Samuel Gompers in his recent announcement from Washington that the American Federation of Labor is to become an organized political party and to take an active part in the coming national campaign, and in his appeal for a \$2,000,000 fund for the defeat of blacklisted congressmen has been promptly accepted in a statement made public here today by the Citizens' Industrial Association, the organization which is conducting the fight for the open shop. The citizens association is equipped with a national organization, and has affiliated bodies in practically every congressional district. It proposes to join issue with the laborites all along the line. Wherever the labor unions make a fight against the reelection of a congressman as Mr. Gompers has announced that they will do in the case of Speaker Cannon, Congressmen Littlefield of Maine, McCall of Massachusetts, Jenkins of Wisconsin, Barthold of Missouri and a number of other leaders who have declined to support measures advocated by the unions, the citizens' association will take part in the fight.

The statement issued by the association today through its President Mr. C. W. Post, is addressed "to the 78,000,000 citizens not members of the labor unions," and says that the labor union movement in politics is one of "opposition to candidates selected to represent the interests of the common people, put opposed to the selfish interests of the Labor Trust."

"Many statements in the proclamation of the American Federation of Labor are misleading," said Mr. Post. "For instance it declares that labor makes no demand upon government or society which is not equally accorded to all the people of our country."

The facts are that organized labor demands not only of government but of all industrial enterprise that no labor be purchased except of the labor unions, an organized trust for the sale of labor. It further demands that no man or woman be allowed to work or sell their labor except by joining the trust, paying fees to its officers and working only under the dictates of that trust.

"Again it says, 'Congressmen and senators in their frenzied rush after the almighty dollar have been indifferent or hostile to the rights of man.' On the contrary, members of Congress in the majority of instances have sought to represent all their con-

stituents, the masses of the common people and to protect them from the continued attacks of organized labor in its efforts to pass laws to rob men of their right to free labor.

"A frenzied rush after the almighty dollar is the basis of the trust movement, the object of which is to extract extra money from the masses, and divide it among the trust members. This feature is as much a part of the Labor trust as of any other.

"While Mr. Gompers announces that 'the wheels of industry cannot be halted nor turned back nor should they be even if it were possible,' it is a fact that at the time this statement of the Federation of Labor was published the unions were actively engaged in stopping the rebuilding of San Francisco and 'halting the wheels of industry' in nearly every city of importance in America, by strikes, threats, assaults and violence, including the dynamiting of property.

"In view of the glaring misstatements and evident desire to mislead the public, caution is required in considering any proclamation of the Labor Trust. Very few communities have escaped harm and loss from having industries stopped by some arbitrary act of the Labor Unions in applying their coercive methods. Thousands of citizens have suffered loss of houses, property and occupation and have been subjected to countless assaults, and hundreds of murders have been committed by members of this trust in trying to force their trust mandates upon the common people.

"They offer as an excuse that capitalists have caused suffering by paying too low wages and therefore they have a right to pursue methods that produce suffering to citizens not members of their organization, based upon the theory that because a disolute man committed murder for some fancied grievance, any other man would have a right to do likewise.

"It is a menace to the people at large to allow any organization of labor or capital to dominate their affairs, either political or otherwise, and when a combined movement is made by the Labor Trust to secure such control it must be met by the citizens of all classes for self-protection. All admit the right of men to organize into classes, either with Capital or Labor and to strive to better the condition of the members, but when they mass to secure political control, danger is apparent.

"If the beef, flour, oil, gas and other capital trusts should mass to elect their representatives to Congress or the State Legislatures, the people would suffer and have suffered in the

past from the few members that have been so elected. The same is true if the Labor Trust should succeed in electing its members to these bodies. Members elected by any organization must represent that organization and the basis of all such movements is to gather extra money from the common people and divide the loot among the trust members. Public men must be selected by the people, the common people, and must represent and defend them from the avaricious measures and hidden or open attacks of selfish organizations of all kinds.

"We have notified the citizens' associations in various communities of the proposal of the Labor Trust to dominate the coming elections, and we call upon all citizens, both in and out of the labor unions, to nominate, and elect only such men as will faithfully serve the common people and who will oppose all trust legislation when such shall be in the interests of organizations and opposed to the welfare of the people.

"We particularly invite attention to the attack on the Congressmen who refused to assist the infamous measure of anarchy, the Anti-Injunction bill, a bill proposed by the Labor Unions to tie the hands of the courts and thus permit property to be destroyed and men assaulted before the courts can act. Such a condition or affairs it is thought by the Labor Trust would allow them to terrorize the community and permit their members free license to commit violence without restraint, but it can be seen that an absence of restraining law could as well be used by capital trusts if they should see fit to hire men to attack members of the Labor Trust or blow up their homes in like manner as the labor unions now operate.

"This would be a condition of no law, or anarchy, a return to barbarism not favorable to present day civilization.

"Citizens of all classes must act in defense of their liberties and constitutional rights and actively interest themselves to elect their own representatives. There are 78,000,000 common citizens as compared with about 2,000,000 members of the Labor Trust, many of whom are unwilling members and are at heart patriotic citizens with a desire for the upholding of law and order and who will not vote to place further power in the hands of the Labor Trust leaders. The interests of the great majority, the common people must be conserved and protected by the election of their own representatives whether they be Democrats or Republicans."


