

THE SYNOD ADJOURNS

Lutherans Close Busy Week of Work on Tuesday.

IOWA CHURCH FLOURISHING

Committee Reports Make Very Good Showing. New Officers Elected. Lyons Next Meeting Place.

The Lutheran Synod closed on Tuesday after what the members declare to have been one of its most profitable and pleasant sessions. The visitors enjoyed Denison's hospitality and were loud in their praise of our city and its kindly homes. There were more than 200 in attendance including clergymen, teachers and lay delegates.

On Thursday Rev. J. H. Able of Fort Dodge, District Treasurer reported on the state of the different funds. Vice President Rev. C. C. Schmidt of St. Louis spoke of the great progress that had been made in the Lutheran Colleges throughout the synod. These schools are located in St. Louis, Springfield, Ill., Milwaukee, Wis., Ft. Wayne, Ind., Hawthorne, N. Y., St. Paul, Minn., Concordia, Mo., Addison, Ill., Seward, Neb., New Orleans, La., Conover, N. C. San Francisco, Cal., and in Brazil.

In Iowa the mission work has been well maintained, during the last two years \$9800 has been expended and here is a balance of \$500 on hand. It was announced that a member of the Iowa church had recently left this fund the sum of \$5000. It was voted to raise the salaries of missionaries \$50 per year. It will be necessary to raise \$4650 for this fund this year.

On Friday afternoon occurred the election of officers with the following results.

President Rev. C. Zurrer of Ft. Dodge 1st Vice President Rev. A. D. Grief of Davenport. 2nd Vice President Rev. Theo. Stephan of Sioux City. Candidates for other offices were placed in nomination.

Reports were heard from the committees on church extension, student support and others.

On Saturday the Clergy, the teachers and the lay delegates held their separate meetings; Sunday afternoon services were held in Washington Park, sermons being delivered by Revs. Seltz, Koch and Lundermeyer. These services were largely attended by many Lutherans from all over the county.

On Monday evening another service was held at which the sermon was delivered by Rev. Henke, Rev. Zurrer conducting the service. On Monday afternoon the work of the missions was brought to a close. On Tuesday the following officers of the synod were announced to have been elected:

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE.

The Des Moines Annual Conference of the M. E. Church will begin its Forty Seventh session Wednesday, Sept. 12th. in Wesley Church, Des Moines. The session will be presided over by Bishop Earl Cranston, of Washington, D. C. whose presidency of the Conference for the first time will be heartily welcomed. Rev. C. L. Nye is the entertaining pastor.

The Des Moines Conference represents about one fourth of the territory of the State, and is divided into six districts. Its Roll Call this year will receive response from just three hundred ministers, as follows:—Pastors, 216; Professors, Missionaries, and Evangelists, 12; Supernumerary Preachers, 15; Superannuated Preachers 51; Presiding Elders, 6. It includes 459 churches; a property valuation of a little more than \$2,000,000, and a membership of 51,000.

The business of an Annual Conference is varied, and every hour for a week is crowded full; the forenoons being used for Disciplinary business, while the afternoons and evenings are given up to anniversaries of the various Benevolent Societies. The themes discussed cover a wide range, such as Missions; Education; Temperance; Sabbath Observance; State of Church at large; Social Conditions, etc.

The Des Moines Conference has become quite a Banking institution. Last year the Treasurer received and distributed to the various causes nearly \$90,000. This year the sum will doubtless be larger.

An important part of the business is the examination of young men, for entrance into Conference, and in the Course of Study. Every young man must pass a rigid examination at the door of the conference; and then every year for four years, in a course of study equivalent to the curriculum of a Theological Seminary.

The great day of the Conference is Sunday. Its time honored features bring Methodists from near and far to the seat of the Conference. The day opens with a Love Feast at nine o'clock. This is followed by ordination of Deacons, and the Bishop's sermon, which is always an event. In the afternoon the Elders are ordained by the Bishop, and the Conference Missionary sermon is preached. This year this duty falls upon the pastor of the Denison church. The evening of Sunday is given to a mass meeting, sometimes with several speakers.

The last time of the Conference business, and one in which is centered more interests than any other, is the reading of the appointments. In the afternoons during the Conference week. The Cabinet, consisting of the Bishop and the Presiding Elders, have been struggling to adjust two hundred men to as many places, and now the Bishop stands up to read the list. Some think they know where they are going, but none are absolutely certain, and the utmost silence prevails. When the last name is read, and the benediction pronounced, then comes a scatter; some going to places that are old, and some to places that are new. But every preacher has a place; and every place has a preacher.

The church at Denison has had a prosperous year, and will be able to report progress when the roll is called. In benevolence it will stand well, its contribution this year, including the W. F. M. S. and the W. H. M. S. will approximate \$1200.
