

DIFS AT HOSPITAL IN ST. PAUL.

The sad and untimely death of Mrs. Andrew Larson occurred at the Bethesda Hospital at St. Paul, Minn., on Wednesday, Aug. 22, 1906. Some three weeks ago, Mrs. Larson accompanied by three children went to Marine Mills, Minn., being summoned by the sickness of her father who was not expected to live at the time she received the news and going immediately she, however, never reached his bedside while he was alive.

Remaining to attend the funeral and to spend a few days with her mother and relatives was cut very short owing to her poor health which was failing her very fast. She has been in poor health for a long time and during the past six months the ailments she was suffering from was draining her vitality rapidly. The trip to Minnesota and the straining ordeal upon her of the death and funeral of her father seemed to overtax her strength and apparently in this weakened condition she did not possess the strength to resist the disease that finally accomplished its work.

Upon the death of her father, her husband, Andrew Larson left for Marine Mills to be present at the funeral and was with her during her last days. On Saturday prior to her death, she went to St. Paul and entered the hospital in hopes of obtaining relief and if possible a cure, but continued to grow weaker until on Wednesday morning at 5:15 she breathed her last and was released from the sufferings and sickness which had marred her enjoyment of life so many days.

The attending doctor at the hospital pronounced her ailment and cause of her death, abscess of the liver. A sad journey indeed, for the husband and children going home, bringing the wife and devoted mother, a corpse and sad for the two boys at home to meet their dead mother at the depot as the train came in, who only a few days before bade them goodbye.

The funeral was held on Friday. The services were held from the Baptist church, its pastor Rev. A. Lysell conducting the same. A large concourse of relatives and friends gathered to pay their last respect and to take a last look upon the departed one and to follow the remains to their last resting place in the Kiron cemetery.

Mrs. Larson was born in the state of Illinois in the year 1857 and moved with her parents to Minnesota in the year 1880 when she was married to Andrew Larson and moved to this locality. Besides her husband she leaves three sons and two daughters to miss her presence and help and to mourn her departure together with an aged mother, one brother and a number of relatives. Her brother A. B. Falk was a former resident of old Kiron some years ago, conducting a general store and handling Uncle Sam's mail business. Her father was one of Sherman's veterans. The bereaved family have the sympathy of all in their keen loss of a wife and loving mother. The pall bearers were G. A. Norelius, Swan Mauritz, Wm. Lindberg, Nels Larson, C. A. Dolk and N. P. Swanson.—Kiron News.

WEATHER-CROP BULLETIN.

The week ending September 3 was much cooler than the preceding seven days, but the average temperature was nearly normal and was favorable for the growing crops and farm operations. The week closed with well distributed showers which will be beneficial to pastures, late potatoes and the belated portion of the corn crop, especially in portions of the central and southern sections. The corn crop is doing well in all districts, except in limited areas where the rain fall was insufficient in the latter part of August. A large part of the crop is well dented. Reports indicate that fully three-fourths of the crop will be well matured by September 20, under normal weather conditions, and all of it will be practically safe by the 30th. Cutting operations will be begun this week in early planted fields. As a whole the crop is very satisfactory. Fall plowing is in progress where moisture is sufficient. General crop conditions are excellent.
