## DISTRICT CONVENTION

Temperance Workers Hold Interesting Sessions.

### MRS. DARLING PRESIDES.

Branch of W. C. T. U. Hold Convention at First Baptist Church This Week.

The 10th annual convention of the 17th District of the Womans Christian Temperance Union met in the Baptist church Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 11, at 2 o'clock. A goodly number of delegates from the different unions of the district was present, also the State President, Mrs. Marion H. Dunham of Burlington.

The convention opened with Mrs. Lucia Darling of Morningside Dist. President in the chair.

Mrs. Marie Matzen of Battle Creek led the devotions, reading the crusade Psalm, followed by an inspiring prayer by Mrs. Darling.

Roll call was responded to by interesting temperance news items. One of the most encouraging was given by our state President "The area of the prohibition territory is steadily enlarging."

Rev. Gauger led the devotions, followed by an anthem by the choir "I Was Glad When They Said Unto Me" Then followed addresses of welcome. The churches, represented by Rev. W. E. Bryce; schools by Prof. E. W. Fellows; Denison Normal College by Prof. W. C. Van Ness; Federation of Womans Clubs by Mrs. J. B. Romans; Denison Union by Mrs. S. L. Gable. Mayor Carey being unexpectedly called from the city was unable to represent the citizens in an address. His place was ably filled by Mr. P. W. Harding, who with his characteristic good will welcomed the convention. Miss Jennie Crane of Battle Creek, responded to the addresses briefly and to the point. Mrs. B. J. Sibbert favored the convention with a beautiful solo. The last number on the program was an address on the subject "Can the Church Evangelize the World Without First Destroying the Liquor Traffic?" by Rev. Alex MacGeorge. Rev. MacGeorge is an earnest, eloquent speaker and handled the subject well.

Mrs. Darling gave an appropriate greeting to the convention. Excellent reports were read from the different unions in the District. Mrs.

Dunham then spoke on the subject "How the unions can do better and more profitable work during the coming year," after which she conducted an open parliament answering satisfactorily the many questions.

Convention adjourned with the singing of the convention hymn and repeating the W. C. T. U. benediction.

The evening session was very well attended despite the inclemency of the weather and all felt fully repaid for the effort made.

### AN INTERESTING MEETING.

Rev. Geo. Campbell of Carroll and Prof. Geo. Lee of Sac City, acted as moderator and clerk. The introductory sermon was delivered by Rev. Collins of Sac City and the doctrinal sermon by Rev. C. H. Stull of the Baptist church, this city.

It was not decided when the association would meet next year, but the sentiment was in favor of June if the association does not disband—a strong sentiment being in favor of doing so for the purpose of uniting with a larger band of Baptists.

The delegates and visitors expressed themselves very favorably of Denison and its splendid prosperity.

### AN OLD SETTLER HAS GONE.

Mrs. Henry Shirtcliff Passes to Her Final Reward.

Many friends all over the county will be grieved to learn of the death of that splendid pioneer woman Mrs. Henry Shirtcliff. For more than thirty years she has been known and loved in this county as one of the good and helpful women. She has been an invalid for the past few years but at the time of the Old Settlers picnic she was able to be driven to the grounds and many will remember her as she sat surrounded by her many friends whom, unknown to all she was meeting for the last time. It was a day of pleasant memories for her and it will be a source of comfort to her friends that they saw last in such a happy frame. For the past two weeks before her death her illness grew more and more serious and she died on Tuesday, Sept. 11th at the home of her daughter Mrs. J. L. Ainsworth. The funeral services will be held at the home, tomorrow, Friday afternoon at 1 o'clock and interment will be made at the Deloit cemetery. Rev. Arthur Pratt will officiate at the services.

Mrs. Shirtcliff, whose maiden name was Frances Colley, was born at Leeds, England, April 2nd 1829. She was married to Mr. Henry Shirtcliff, at her native city on December 6th 1851 coming to America immediately after the wedding. Their first home was in Illinois, in 1855 they moved to Minnesota and in October 1873 they first came to Crawford county, living near Deloit. Six years later they moved to Vail, which city was their home until their removal to Denison in 1904. For the past six years Mrs. Shirtcliff has been an invalid but she bore her suffering with fortitude and patience. She was the mother of nine children of whom but three survive her. They are E. F. Shirtcliff of Alberta, Canada, F. R. Shirtcliff of Charter Oak and Mrs. J. L. Ainsworth of Denison. Throughout life she was a consistent Christian and she leaves to her husband and her children a blessed record of good deeds. May the gentle soul find in the bosom of her Master that peace which passeth all understanding.
